Chapter 220.

CHAP. 220.

Resolve for the payment of roll of accounts numbered thirty-five.

Resolved, That there be allowed and paid out of any money in the treasury of the state, not otherwise appropriated, to the several persons, towns and plantations respectively named in the roll of accounts numbered thirty-five, the sums set against the names of such persons, towns and plantations, amounting in the aggregate to the sum of seventy-nine hundred eighty-two dollars and fifty-five cents, in full discharge of all the claims and demands to which they severally refer.

Chapter 221.

Resolve authorizing the secretary of state to effect certain exchanges of public documents.

Resolved, That the secretary of state is hereby authorized to embrace in the list of exchanges with the different states of the Union one set of all our legislative, educational, and agricultural documents.

Chapter 222.

Resolve extending the time when certain lands shall be declared forfeited to the state.

Resolved, That the time when certain lands shall be declared to be forfeited to the state shall be the first day of January, eighteen hundred and fifty-seven, instead of the first day of January, eighteen hundred and fifty-six, as provided by resolve approved April twentieth, eighteen hundred and fifty-four. *Provided*, nothing herein contained shall be construed as extending the time for the payment of the notes in the land office, or as exonerating the land agent from collecting said notes, as now required by law.
