CHAP. 267.**Chapter 267.**

Resolve on the pay roll of the senate.

Pay roll of

*Resolved,* That there be paid to the several persons named in the accompanying roll, the sums set against their names respectively, amounting in the whole to the sum of six thousand nine hundred and ten dollars and fifty cents.

[Approved March 17, 1855.]

**Chapter 268.**

Resolve in favor of certain persons of the legislature, who visited the state prison.

*Resolved,* That there be paid out of the treasury of the state the following sums, namely:

To D. K. Hobart, seven dollars,  
 “ Hezekiah Means, seven dollars,  
 “ Jacob B. Ham, seven dollars,  
 “ William Merrill, seven dollars,

members of the legislature, appointed to visit the state prison, agreeable to an order passed February seventeenth, eighteen hundred and fifty-five.

**Chapter 269.**

Resolve authorizing the land agent to sell the lot reserved for the future disposition of the legislature, in the town of Brownville.

Authorized to

ville.

*Resolved,* That the land agent be, and he is hereby authorized to sell at public or private sale, for such price as to him shall seem to be reasonable, the lot reserved for the future disposition of the legislature, in the town of Brownville.
