CHAP. 566.**Chapter 566.**

An act to incorporate the South Kennebec Agricultural Aid Society.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

Corporators.	SECT. 1. That William S. Grant, Daniel Lancaster, John Stone, Nathan Foster, Samuel Dinslow, George Brown, John Webb, William Palmer, Henry Dow, Joshua D. Warren, Stephen Lord, Daniel A. Fairbanks, Franklin Glazier, Jr., and other
Corporate name.	members of the association called the South Kennebec Agricultural Aid Society, are hereby created a body corporate by
Authorized to hold property, &c.	that name, and are authorized to hold property, real and personal, not exceeding in value the sum of twelve thousand dol-
Amount. Powers and privileges.	lars, and to exercise the general powers of corporations for the purpose of aiding the cause of agriculture in the South Kennebec Agricultural Society.
Shares, par value of.	SECT. 2. The stock of this corporation shall be divided into shares, the par value of which shall be ten dollars each; and the members of the association called the South Kennebec Agricultural Aid Society, shall be stockholders in this corporation.
Each share shall entitle the holder to one vote.	SECT. 3. Stockholders in this company shall have one vote for each share subscribed and held, on which all assessments have been paid.
First meeting, how called.	SECT. 4. The first meeting of this corporation shall be called by any three of the persons named in the first section hereof, by notice published in the Maine Farmer and Gardiner Transcript, two weeks successively, the last publication to be one week at least before the time of meeting; at this meeting the corporation shall be organized, officers chosen, by-laws adopted, and the time and manner of calling future meetings fixed.
---business of.	SECT. 5. This act shall take effect from and after its approval by the governor.
