Income, how applied.

Corporate property, conveyance of, authorized.

First meeting, now called. wise, the annual income of which not to exceed two thousand dollars; said income to be faithfully applied to promote the cause of education; and the trustees aforesaid are intrusted with all the powers and privileges incident to similar corporations. They shall be authorized, at any time, to convey and transfer their buildings, and all their corporate property, to the school district in which such buildings may be situated, for the use of public schools therein.

SECT. 2. Any two of the above named corporators are authorized to call the first meeting of said corporation, by posting up notices therefor, in two or more public places in said Ellsworth, seven days at least before the time appointed for said meeting.

SECT. 3. This act shall take effect from and after its approval by the governor.

#### Chapter 604.

An act to incorporate the Unitarian Parsonage Proprietary in Belfast.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

SECT. 1. James P. White, Paul R. Hazeltine, Alfred W. Johnson, John W. White, Oakes Angier, Josiah Simpson, Daniel Haraden and William H. Burrill, their associates and successors, are hereby constituted a corporation by the name of the Unitarian Parsonage Proprietary, for the purpose of building and owning a parsonage house in Belfast, and may hold property to the value of five thousand dollars, have and exercise all the powers and privileges of similar corporations.

SECT. 2. James P. White is hereby authorized to call the first meeting of said corporation by posting a notice of the time and place of said meeting on the door of the Unitarian Church in Belfast, at least seven days previous thereto.
