Chapter 41.

An act to incorporate the town of Winn.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

SECT. 1. The tract of land in the county of Penobscot, now known as the plantation of Five Islands, or River township number four, and bounded on the northwest by the Penobscot river, on the southwest by the town of Lincoln, on the south by the town of Lee, on the east by township number six in range number three, on the north by east Indian township, or Mattawamkeag plantation, so called, with the inhabitants thereon, is hereby incorporated into a town by the name of Winn; and the inhabitants of said town are hereby vested with all the powers, privileges and immunities, and subject to the same liabilities, as other incorporated towns in this state.

SECT. 2. Any justice of the peace within said county is hereby empowered to issue a warrant to any inhabitant of the new town hereby created, directing him to call the first meeting of the inhabitants thereof, at such time and place in said town as shall be appointed in said warrant, for the choice of such officers as towns are by law empowered and required to choose at their annual meetings.

SECT. 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its approval by the governor.

Chapter 42.

An act to incorporate the Little River Canal Company.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

SECT. 1. Ebenezer C. Staples, Alvan Googins, Alexander M. Leavitt, Enoch Pillsbury, Leonard Waterhouse, A. B. Googins, H. A. Googins and Cyrus Means, all of Saco, in the county of York, and their associates, successors and assigns, are hereby incorporated by the name of the Little River Canal Company, with all the powers and privileges, and subject to the conditions and liabilities, set forth in chapter seventy-six of the revised statutes, for the purposes hereinafter specified.
