PRIVATE AND SPECIAL LAWS

OF THE

Снар. 113.

Capital stock,

Proviso.

The capital stock of said corporation shall not be less than one thousand nor more than ten thousand shares, of one hundred dollars each. Any person subscribing to said stock shall be personally liable to pay the assessments thereon, not exceeding one hundred dollars per share; provided, that no shareholder in said company shall be, in any manner whatever, liable for any debt or demand due by said company beyond the extent of his, her, or their shares, in the capital stock of said company not paid up. The treasurer of said corporation shall make a semi-annual statement, under oath, of the condition of said company, in the manner prescribed by law in relation to manufacturing corporations.

Treasurer, duty

First meeting, how called.

This act shall take effect from and after its approval by the governor; and any person, named in this act, may call the first meeting of said corporation for the purpose of organizing the same, by giving notice thereof, by publication in some newspaper printed in Portland, at least fourteen days before the time appointed for such meeting.

Chapter 113.

An act to incorporate the Berwick Manufacturing Company.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Corporators.

Corpcrate name.

May hold real and personal estate to the amount of \$100,000. Powers, privi-leges, &c.

First meeting, how called.

Oliver Hill, Ichabod G. Jordan, Daniel G. Rollins, SECT. 1. Thomas B. Parks, Ivory M. Nute, Job Harris, Franklin J. Rollins, James M. Tebbetts, their associates and successors, are hereby incorporated and made a body politic, by the name of the Berwick Manufacturing Company, for the purpose of manufacturing leather, boots, shoes and other articles manufactured in whole or in part from leather, at Berwick, in the county of York.

Said corporation may hold real and personal estate to the amount of one hundred thousand dollars in value, and shall have all the powers and privileges, and be subject to all the duties and liabilities of corporations, as defined by the laws of this state.

The first meeting of the corporation may be called by either one of the corporators, by written notice delivered in person; said notice to be seven days at least prior to said meeting,
