**Chapter 16.**

Resolve in favor of the Penobscot Indians.

*Resolved,* That there be paid from the state treasury to the agent of the Penobscot Indians, the sum of four hundred dollars, to be expended under the direction of said agent, to aid said Indians in their agricultural pursuits, by purchasing seed and assisting them in planting the same.

**Chapter 17.**

Resolve in favor of the Passamaquoddy Indians.

*Resolved,* That there be paid from the state treasury to the agent of the Passamaquoddy Indians, the sum of four hundred dollars, to be expended under the direction of said agent, to aid said Indians in their agricultural pursuits, by purchasing seed and assisting them in planting the same.

**Chapter 18.**

Resolve to promote the education of the Penobscot Indians.

*Resolved,* That there be paid out of the state treasury under the direction of the governor and council, to such persons as they may direct, the sum of three hundred and fifty dollars, to be expended by the superintending school committee of the town of Oldtown, for the purpose of maintaining among the Penobscot Indians, a school or schools for their education. And said committee are hereby required, on or before the first day of January next, to make full return of their doings under this resolve to the secretary of state, to be laid before the next legislature, specifying the time said schools have been kept, and by whom, the average number in attendance, and such other facts as they may deem for the interest of education among said Indians, or which the governor and council may require.
