CHAP. 150.

By-laws.

May hold real or personal estate, annual income not to exceed \$3,000.

-how appropriated.

First meeting, how called.

and use a common seal, to prosecute and defend suits at law, to make and establish such by-laws, not repugnant to the laws of this state, as may be deemed necessary for the management of their affairs; to fill all vacancies occurring in their number, to take and hold any estate, real or personal, which they now possess, or may hereafter receive by donation or otherwise, the annual income of which shall not exceed the sum of three thousand dollars; said income to be faithfully applied to promote the cause of education.

SECT. 3. Any two of the persons above named may call the first meeting of said corporation, by publishing a notice thereof in the Aroostook Pioneer, or by giving written notice thereof to the persons above named, seven days at least before the time appointed for said meeting.

SECT. 4. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its approval by the governor.

#### Chapter 150.

An act to prevent the destruction of fish in Jackson pond, so called, in the town of

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Fish, taking of, prohibited.

SECT. 1. All persons are hereby prohibited from taking fish from Jackson pond, so called, in the town of Concord, in any manner, at any time, between the first day of April, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, and the first day of April, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one.

SECT. 2. If any person shall take any fish contrary to the provisions of the first section of this act, upon conviction thereof before any court competent to try the same, he shall forfeit and pay for every fish so taken, a fine of not less than three dollars, nor more than ten dollars, one-half thereof to the complainant and the other

half to the use of said town of Concord.

SECT. 3. This act shall take effect from and after the first day of April, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight.
