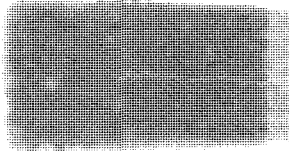

PRIVATE AND SPECIAL LAWS

OF THE

STATE OF MAINE.

1859.

Chapter 259.

An act to incorporate the Mercantile Bank.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

SECT. 1. Samuel Larabee, Caleb Billings, David Bugbee, John S. Ricker, Charles Hayward, Moses G. Rice, Samuel P. Strickland, Solomon Parsons and Jabez True, their associates, successors and assigns, are hereby incorporated into a company by the name of the President, Directors and Company of the Mercantile Bank.

Corporators.

Corporate name.

SECT. 2. The capital stock of said bank shall be fifty thousand dollars, divided into shares of fifty dollars each; said bank to be located at Bangor, in the county of Penobscot.

Capital stock, \$50,000.
Shares.

SECT. 3. Said corporators are hereby authorized and empowered to exercise all the rights and privileges conferred upon such corporations by the laws of this state, and shall be subject to all the liabilities and restrictions thereof.

Rights, privileges, &c.

Chapter 260.

An act to incorporate the Somesville Manufacturing Company.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

SECT. 1. Daniel E. Somes, Neal Dow and Charles Hill, their associates, successors and assigns, are hereby constituted and made a body politic by the name of the Somesville Manufacturing Company, and by that name may sue and be sued, have a common seal and alter the same at pleasure, and have and exercise all the powers and privileges, and be subject to all the duties and liabilities provided in the laws of this state regulating manufacturing corporations.

Corporators.

Corporate name.

Powers, privileges, &c.

SECT. 2. Said corporation is authorized to hold all such real and personal estate as they may deem necessary and proper to enable them to carry on the manufacture and sale of paper or of articles of wood, iron, steel, leather or of any other material, the manufacture of which is not prohibited by the laws of this state, *provided*, the whole amount of the capital stock of said company shall not exceed two hundred thousand dollars.

May hold real and personal estate.

Proviso.

SECT. 3. Either of the persons named in this act, may call the first meeting of this company by giving a written notice thereof to the above named persons, seven days at least prior to said meeting.

First meeting, how called.
