Chapter 263.

An act to incorporate the officers and members of Jerusalem Royal Arch Chapter.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

Corporators.	Orlando Currier, Daniel Russell, J. D. Warren, their associates and successors, are hereby incorporated into a body politic, by the
Corporate name.	name of Jerusalem Royal Arch Chapter, to be established and have their places of business in the cities of Augusta, Hallowell and Gardiner or either of the above named cities, in the county of Kennebec, with power to take and hold, for masonic, charitable and benevolent purposes, real estate to the value of five thousand dol-
May hold real and personal estate.	lars, and personal estate to the value of five thousand dollars, to give and grant or bargain and sell the same at pleasure, with all the
Powers, privileges, &c.	privileges usually granted to corporations for masonic, charitable and benevolent purposes, not inconsistent with the laws of this state.

Chapter 264.

An act to incorporate the officers and members of Mariners' Lodge.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

Corporators.	Malboro Packard, Charles H. Whitney, Joseph P. Sweetser and their associates and successors, are hereby incorporated into a body
Corporate name.	politic by the name of Mariners' Lodge, to be established and have its place of business in Searsport in the county of Waldo, with power
May hold real and personal estate.	to take and hold, for masonic, charitable and benevolent purposes, real estate to the value of five thousand dollars, and personal estate to the value of ten thousand dollars, to give and grant, or bargain
Privileges, &c.	and sell the same at pleasure, with all the privileges usually granted to corporations for masonic, charitable and benevolent purposes, not inconsistent with the laws of this state.
