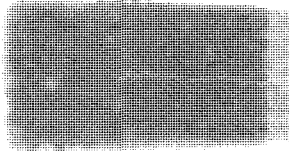

CHAP. 341.

certain proceedings in, made valid.

Penobscot county shall not be affected by neglect of the officers of said plantations in making and keeping the records of the same, but shall be as valid and sufficient for all purposes as if the proper records had been made and kept; and proof of the same may be made in any case where said proceedings are called in question.

Chapter 341.

An act to change the names of certain persons.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Names changed.

SECT. 1. John McFarland of Swanville, shall be allowed to take the name of John M. Nickerson; Aaron Morang of Chelsea, shall be allowed to take the name of Aaron Winthrop; and that of his wife Elizabeth Morang, shall be allowed to take the name of Elizabeth Winthrop; Francis A. Shaw of New Sharon, shall be allowed to take the name of Francis A. Clark; Eliza Metcalf Hicks of Winthrop, shall be allowed to take the name of Eliza Metcalf; Betsey Packard of Harrison, shall be allowed to take the name of Betsey Hobbs; Gilman Scott of Minot, shall be allowed to take the name of Gilman Rice; Charles Holt of Albany, shall be allowed to take the name of Charles Leon Holt; Elvira K. Briscall of Frankfort, shall be allowed to take the name of Elvira K. Rich; Benjamin Franklin Brown of Bangor, shall be allowed to take the name of Franklin Benjamin Brown; Horatio Alfred Hilling of Bath, shall be allowed to take the name of John Hilling.

SECT. 2. This act shall take effect from and after its approval by the governor.

Chapter 342.

An act additional to "an act creating the Norway Village Corporation."

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Certain territory set off from Paris to

SECT. 1. All that territory embraced in the act entitled, "an act to set off certain territory from the town of Paris and annex the same to the town of Norway," approved March eighteenth, in the

year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, is hereby annexed to the said Norway Village Corporation; and the said territory together with the inhabitants resident thereon, shall be subject to all the liabilities, and entitled to all the privileges of the act creating said corporation.

CHAP. 343.

Norway is annexed to Norway village corporation.

SECT. 2. This act shall be in force from and after its approval by the governor.

Chapter 343.

An act to set off a part of the town of Alexander and annex the same to Crawford.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

All that part of the town of Alexander constituting the farm now owned and occupied by Godfrey Lydick is hereby set off from Alexander and annexed to Crawford; but said land is subject to all arrears of taxes heretofore assessed upon it by the town of Alexander.

Alexander, part of, set off from, and annexed to Crawford.

Chapter 344.

An act to set off certain territory from the town of Leeds and annex the same to the town of Wayne.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

SECT. 1. All the land of Augustus Hood and the buildings thereon, described as follows:—Beginning at a stone monument, the corner of Leeds and Wayne, on the east line of East Livermore, thence north eighty-six degrees west on said line, fifteen rods and twenty-two links, to a town road; thence south forty-three and one-half degrees west, on the south line of said road two rods and twenty-two links; thence south two degrees west on the east line of Noanan Bishop eighty-seven rods fifteen links; thence south eighty-seven degrees east thirty-five rods; thence north fifty-five degrees east, twenty-two rods and fourteen links to the town line of Wayne; thence north twenty and three-fourths degrees west on said town line eighty-three rods and fifteen links to the corner or bound begun at; said land being in the town of Leeds and county of Androscoggin,

Leeds, certain territory set off from, and annexed to Wayne.
