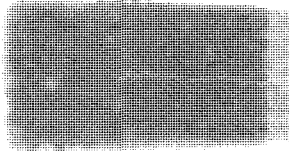

year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, is hereby annexed to the said Norway Village Corporation; and the said territory together with the inhabitants resident thereon, shall be subject to all the liabilities, and entitled to all the privileges of the act creating said corporation.

CHAP. 343.

Norway is annexed to Norway village corporation.

SECT. 2. This act shall be in force from and after its approval by the governor.

Chapter 343.

An act to set off a part of the town of Alexander and annex the same to Crawford.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

All that part of the town of Alexander constituting the farm now owned and occupied by Godfrey Lydick is hereby set off from Alexander and annexed to Crawford; but said land is subject to all arrears of taxes heretofore assessed upon it by the town of Alexander.

Chapter 344.

An act to set off certain territory from the town of Leeds and annex the same to the town of Wayne.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

SECT. 1. All the land of Augustus Hood and the buildings thereon, described as follows:—Beginning at a stone monument, the corner of Leeds and Wayne, on the east line of East Livermore, thence north eighty-six degrees west on said line, fifteen rods and twenty-two links, to a town road; thence south forty-three and one-half degrees west, on the south line of said road two rods and twenty-two links; thence south two degrees west on the east line of Noanan Bishop eighty-seven rods fifteen links; thence south eighty-seven degrees east thirty-five rods; thence north fifty-five degrees east, twenty-two rods and fourteen links to the town line of Wayne; thence north twenty and three-fourths degrees west on said town line eighty-three rods and fifteen links to the corner or bound begun at; said land being in the town of Leeds and county of Androscoggin,

Leeds, certain territory set off from, and annexed to Wayne.

CHAP. 345.

and by this act is set off to the town of Wayne and county of Kennebec.

SECT. 2. This act shall be in force from and after its approval by the governor.

Chapter 345.

An act to set off certain described lands owned by Orren Irish, from the town of Canton and annex the same to Peru.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

Orren Irish,
land of, set off
from Canton
and annexed to
Peru.

The following described land shall be set off from Canton and annexed to the town of Peru :—Commencing at the town line on the banks of the Androscoggin river and running thence southeasterly by the river forty-eight rods ; thence south thirty-one degrees west sixteen rods ; thence south sixty-one degrees west twenty-two rods ; thence south four degrees west eighty-two rods ; thence south seventy-five degrees west eighty-six rods ; thence north four degrees east forty-four rods ; thence south eighty-six degrees west forty-eight rods to the town line between the towns of Canton and Peru ; thence by said town line, north forty-six degrees east one hundred and sixty rods to the first mentioned bound ; the above described land lies in the town of Canton and belongs to said Orren Irish and is his home farm.

Chapter 346.

An act to incorporate the Bangor Kerosene Oil Company.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

Corporators.

SECT. 1. William Arnold, James Dunning and William H. Parsons, their associates and successors are hereby constituted a body politic and corporate, by the name of the Bangor Kerosene Oil Company, for the purpose of manufacturing oil from coal, and are vested with all the powers and privileges and subject to all the restrictions and liabilities by law incident to corporations of a similar nature.
