Chapter 215.

CHAP. 215.

Resolve authorizing a book case and cabinet to be constructed in the agricultural room in the state house.

Resolved, That the governor with the advice of the council, cause to be constructed in the agricultural room in the state house a book case and cabinet not to exceed in value one hundred dollars, to be used as a deposit for agricultural books and agricultural specimens; and when the same is completed the governor is hereby authorized to draw his warrant upon the treasury for said amount of one hundred dollars.

Chapter 216.

Resolve in favor of Emma Sweeny.

Resolved. That the land agent be authorized to convey to Emma Sweeny of Ellsworth, that part of lot numbered two hundred sixtyone in Ellsworth, conveyed to Robert Sweeny by the then land agent December third, eighteen hundred and thirty, the sum of eighty-two dollars having been paid to the state, and to be in full payment for that part of said lot hereby authorized to be conveyed.
