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CHAP. 249. in his judgment it is for the interest of said Indians to use a portion of said four hundred dollars in purchasing a yoke of oxen for use of said tribe, he is hereby empowered to do so.

Resolved, That there shall be paid from the treasury the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars to be expended for schooling of Passamaquoddy Indians, under the supervision of the school committees of Princeton and Perry, and said committees shall report to the governor and council specifying the time the schools are kept, the number of scholars, and such other matters as they may deem of interest.

Chapter 249.

Resolve in favor of William M. Jordan.

William M. Jordan, in favor of.

Resolved, That there be paid out of the treasury of the state to William M. Jordan of Buxton, the sum of four dollars per month during the pleasure of the legislature, for injuries received while in the service of the state; and that the pension of four dollars per month commence on the first day of January, eighteen hundred and fifty-nine.

Chapter 250.

Resolve in favor of Penobscot Indians attending school in town of Greenbush.

Penobscot Indians attending school in Greenbush, in favor of.

Resolved, That there shall be paid to the superintending school committee of the town of Greenbush the sum of two dollars for each and every Indian child that shall attend the schools in said town for a term not less than two months in each year, and that said superintending school committee shall return the number of such scholars so attending for said term of two months to the secretary of state; and the governor is hereby authorized to draw his warrant for such amount on satisfactory evidence being adduced to governor and council.
