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CHAP. 113.**Chapter 113.**

Resolve in favor of Asa Redington.

Asa Redington,

*Resolved,* That there be paid out of the treasury to Asa Redington, twenty-nine dollars and thirty cents in full for the amount of tax and interest paid by him into the state treasury on the twenty-fourth day of September eighteen hundred and fifty-six, assessed on township number seventeen in the middle district in the county of Washington, it appearing that previous to the assessment of said tax, the township had been incorporated into a town.

**Chapter 114.**

Resolve in favor of Joseph Nichola and Solomon Francis and family.

*Resolved,* That there be paid out of the state treasury, the sum of one hundred and twenty-eight dollars, as hereinafter mentioned: seventy-five dollars to Joseph Nichola, for his services as representative of the Penobscot tribe of Indians in the legislature; fifty-three dollars to Solomon Francis and family, members of the Passamaquoddy tribe of Indians, for bounties due them for the years eighteen hundred fifty-nine, eighteen hundred sixty and eighteen hundred sixty-one.
