Chapter 168.

Resolve in favor of the town of Blanchard.

WHEREAS, the town of Blanchard in the county of Piscataquis with but thirty-six polls and a valuation of only twenty-three thousand two hundred and ninety-two dollars, has been for a long time burdened by the support of three insane paupers, therefore,

Resolved, That there be paid from the state treasury to said town the sum of one hundred and twenty dollars per annum, so long as it shall continue to support said paupers, and in that proportion in case either of said paupers should decease.

Chapter 169.

Resolve in favor of J. W. C. Moore, Joel Bowler, James S. Hall, Joel Phinney, Josiah True and Samuel V. Walker.

Resolved, That the state treasurer be directed to pay to J. W. C. Moore the sum of ten dollars; Joel Bowler fifteen dollars; James S. Hall thirty-five dollars; Joel Phinney twelve dollars; Josiah True thirty dollars; and Samuel V. Walker twelve dollars, the same being for expenses incurred during sickness while members of this house.

Chapter 170.

Resolve for repairing and refitting public buildings and grounds.

Resolved, That two thousand five hundred dollars be and hereby is appropriated for fencing and refitting public grounds, painting and repairing capitol, made necessary by occupation of same by United States troops; said appropriation to be expended under the direction of the governor and council and said amount to be included in the account of this state against the general government for war expenditures.
