Elizabeth Brown, in favor of.

ELIZABETH BROWN .--- T. P. CLEAVES .--- VICTORIES IN THE WEST.

Chapter 178.

Resolve in favor of Elizabeth Brown,

Resolved, That the sum of seventy-six dollars and fifty cents be paid out of the state treasury to Elizabeth Brown of Augusta, in full for the services of herself and her assistants from December eleventh eighteen hundred and sixty-one to February eleventh eighteen hundred and sixty-two, washing floors and bedding for the military general hospital at Augusta, and clothing for its patients from the regiments of Maine volunteers, as an advancement to the United States and a claim against them; and that the governor be authorized to draw his warrant therefor on any moneys in the state treasury not otherwise appropriated.

Chapter 179.

Resolve in favor of Thomas P. Cleaves.

Resolved, That the state treasurer pay to Thomas P. Cleaves, assistant secretary of the senate, the sum of fifteen dollars it being for expenses incurred by reason of sickness during the present session.

Chapter 180.

Resolve in reference to our victories in the west.

Resolved, That the people of Maine have witnessed with patriotic pride the triumph of the Union armies in the valley of the Mississippi, and they hereby extend their congratulations to their loyal brethren of the west upon the undying laurels they have won in the rapid and splendid succession of victories achieved by them. To the troops of Illinois especially for their heroic conduct at Fort Donelson, the country owes a debt of gratitude which cannot be too heartily acknowledged, and which can never be repaid.

Resolved, That a copy of the foregoing be sent to the governor of Illinois and other western states.
