SECT. 3. This act shall take effect from and after its approval CHAP. 265.

Chapter 265.

An act to make valid the doings of North Prospect Burying Ground Corporation.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

SECT. 1. The records, contracts and proceedings of the North Prospect Burying Ground Corporation in the town of Prospect and county of Waldo are hereby made valid.

SECT. 2. This act shall take effect and be in force when approved by the governor.

Chapter 266.

An act to repeal chapter one hundred and nine of the private acts of eighteen hundred and sixty-one relating to scaling of lumber.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

Chapter one hundred and nine of the private acts of eighteen hundred and sixty-one relating to the sale and scaling of lumber is hereby repealed from the date of the approval of this act.

Chapter 267.

An act to incorporate the Little River Manufacturing Company.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

SECT. 1. John G. Tebbets and Edward Plummer of Lisbon, Samuel I. Robinson and Henry W. Owen of Bath, their associates, successors and assigns, are hereby created a body politic and corporate by the name of the Little River Manufacturing Company, to be located at Lisbon, in this state, for the purpose of building a dam and erecting mills and constructing canals at or near Little

CHAP. 268.

Powers, privileges, &c.

May hold real and personal estate.

First meeting, how called.

River village in said Lisbon, with all the usual powers and privileges and subject to all the duties and requirements provided for manufacturing corporations by the general laws of the state.

SECT. 2. The said corporation shall have power to hold real and personal estate to an amount not exceeding at any one time the sum of three hundred thousand dollars, with power to use, manage and dispose of the same, for the purposes authorized by this act.

SECT. 3. Any two of the persons named in this act may call the first meeting of said company, by giving written notice to all parties named in this act, seven days before the time appointed for such meeting.

SECT. 4. This act shall take effect from and after its approval by the governor.

Chapter 268.

An act to authorize Tristram Goldthwait and Lyman F. Verrill to construct a wharf at the "pool" in Biddeford.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

Authorized to construct wharf.

—how constructed.

SECT. 1. Tristram Goldthwait and Lyman F. Verrill, their heirs and assigns, are authorized and empowered to construct and hold a wharf at the "pool," so called, in Biddeford, in the county of York, the same to be one hundred and fifty feet or less in length, and may extend from "fort hill," so called, at the middle eddy, ten feet beyond low water mark ; *provided* the same shall not materially hinder or obstruct navigation.

SECT. 2. This act shall take effect from and after its approval by the governor.

Chapter 269.

An act to incorporate the Robinson Manufacturing Company.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :
