Chapter 252.

An act additional to chapter seven of the revised statutes, relating to the supreme judicial court.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

SECT. 1. The price per volume of the Maine Reports to be furnished to the state and for use in the state, shall be fixed by the governor and council, having regard to the increased cost of printing and materials.

SECT. 2. This act shall take effect when approved.

Chapter 253.

An act to protect parties against the effects of perjury.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legis*lature assembled*, as follows :

SECT. 1. When a judgment has been obtained against a party plaintiff or defendant in the trial of an action in court, by the perjury of witnesses intróduced by the adverse party, the party so injured may maintain an action on the case against such adverse party, or any perjured witness, or any confederate in the perjury to recover the damages sustained by him by reason of such perjury, and the judgment in the former action shall be no bar thereto.

SECT. 2. The action aforesaid, must be commenced within three years from the time the cause thereof accrued or from the final judgment in any proceedings for a review of the original action.

SECT. 3. This act shall take effect when approved by the governor.

Chapter 254.

An act enforcing the provisions of law and treaties relating to the Penobscot tribe of Indians.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legis*lature assembled*, as follows:

SECT. 1. The governor, with the advice of the council, shall superintendent appoint a discreet man of good moral character and industrious appointment habits, to instruct the Penobscot Indians in the arts of husbandry, as stipulated in the treaty of eighteen hundred eighteen made with
