Chapter 374.**CHAP. 374.**

An act to incorporate the Veazie Manufacturing Company.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

SECT. 1. That John W. Veazie, Orlando W. Gilman and Charles Darrow, their associates, successors and assigns, are hereby incorporated into a company by the name of the Veazie Manufacturing Company, with all the powers, privileges and immunities, and subject to all the duties and liabilities provided by the laws of the state concerning manufacturing corporations; and said corporation is authorized to purchase and hold, sell, lease and improve real and personal estate to the amount of five hundred thousand dollars, in the towns of Veazie and Eddington, and divide the same into shares as they may deem convenient; and said company are authorized to carry on the manufacture of cotton, wool, iron, wood and other articles, not contrary to the laws of the state, and for that purpose may purchase or erect on their own lands at Veazie and Eddington, such buildings, mills and machinery, and dam across the river, as may be useful or necessary; *provided*, that such dam shall not be so constructed as to prevent the passage of rafts through or by the same, but shall be furnished with all proper and convenient locks or sluices for that purpose, to be kept in repair and open and convenient for passage, at the expense of the corporation and without toll; the said works, improvements and erections to be so constructed as not to injure or flow any property other than their own, beyond their present rights. The said works are to be subject to all statutes of this state relating to fishways.

Proviso.

SECT. 2. The first meeting of said corporation may be called by either of the persons named in this act, serving a written notice on each of the others, stating the time, place and object of such meeting at least five days before the time of said meeting.

First meeting, how called.

SECT. 3. This act shall take effect from and after its approval by the governor.

Chapter 375.

An act to incorporate the Cumberland Iron Company.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

SECT. 1. Eliphalet Clark, John B. Coyle, Leonard Billings, Harrison J. Libby, William Kimball, James N. Winslow and Moses Gould, their associates and successors, are hereby constituted a

body politic and corporate by the name of the Cumberland Iron Company, for the purpose of manufacturing in the city of Portland, iron in all its branches and forms, from the ore to the various species and uses to which that material is or may be applied, and whatever is connected therewith.

May hold real
and personal

SECT. 2. Said corporation may take and hold real and personal estate to the amount of two hundred thousand dollars as capital, divided into shares of one hundred dollars each, for the uses and purposes of their incorporation; and shall have all the powers and privileges, and be subject to all the duties and requirements of the laws of this state, in regard to similar corporations.

Capital stock.

By-laws.

SECT. 3. They shall have power to divide their capital stock into shares, and to make such by-laws in relation thereto, and the general management of said company, as they may deem advisable.

SECT. 4. This act shall take effect on its approval by the governor.

Chapter 376.

An act to incorporate the town of Ludlow.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

SECT. 1. The plantation of Belfast Academy Grant, in the county of Aroostook, is hereby incorporated into a town by the name of Ludlow, and the inhabitants of the said town are hereby vested with all the powers and privileges and immunities, and subject to all the duties and liabilities of incorporated towns in this state.

SECT. 2. Any justice of the peace within said county is hereby empowered to issue his warrant to some inhabitant of said town, directing him to notify the inhabitants thereof to meet at such time and place as he shall appoint, to choose such officers as other towns are empowered to choose at their annual town meeting.

SECT. 3. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its approval by the governor.
