PRIVATE AND SPECIAL LAWS

OF THE

CHAP. 443. and liabilities provided by the laws of this state, concerning manufacturing corporations.

May hold real and personal estate to an amount of \$200,000.

SECT. 2. Said corporation is authorized to manufacture castings, tools and machinery in the city of Lewiston, to purchase and hold real and personal estate not exceeding in value two hundred thousand dollars, to build and erect such buildings and machinery as their convenience may require, and make all necessary rules and regulations for the prosecution of the same, consistent with the laws of the state.

First meeting, how called.

SECT. 3. Samuel W. Kilvert is hereby authorized to call the first meeting of these corporators, by giving each of the others a written notice of the same, seven days before such meeting.

SECT. 4. This act shall take effect on its approval by the governor.

Chapter 443.

An act to incorporate the Hudson Manufacturing Company.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Corporators.

SECT. 1. Charles Beale, Asa Potter, Jesse L. Tibbetts, their associates, successors and assigns, are hereby constituted a body corporate by the name of the Hudson Manufacturing Company, with all the powers and privileges, and subject to all the duties and liabilities provided by the laws of this state, concerning manufacturing corporations.

Corporate name.
Powers, privileges, &c.

May hold real and personal estate to the amount of \$10,000.

SECT. 2. Said corporation is authorized to manufacture shingles, furniture and other articles of wood, in the town of Hudson, and to purchase and hold real and personal estate not exceeding in value ten thousand dollars, divided into shares of one hundred dollars each, and to build and erect such buildings and machinery as may be required in the prosecution of said business.

First meeting, how called.

SECT. 3. Any two persons named in this act may call the first meeting of said corporation, by posting up two or more notices of the time and place of said meeting, in the town of Hudson aforesaid, seven days previous to said meeting, or by publishing the same three days in succession in some daily newspaper, published in the city of Bangor, the last publication to be seven days before said meeting.

SECT. 4. This act shall take effect from and after its approval.
