Chapter 467.

CHAP. 467.

An act to incorporate the Warren Manufacturing Company.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

SECT. 1. George Warren, H. J. Libby, F. O. Libby, and J. W. Munger, their associates, successors and assigns, are hereby created and constituted a body corporate and politic, by the name of the Warren Manufacturing Company, with all the powers and privileges, and subject to the duties and liabilities, contained in the laws of this state, relating to manufacturing corporations.

Corporators.

Corporate name.
Powers, privileges, &c.

SECT. 2. Said corporation is authorized to manufacture, in the town of Westbrook, in the county of Cumberland, woolen or cotton, or woolen and cotton goods, and for said purposes to construct, repair and maintain, upon their own lands, suitable dams, canals, water courses, buildings and machinery ; and to purchase and hold real and personal estate not exceeding the value of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars, at any one time, and to sell and dispose of their property, as other similar corporations are allowed to do, by the laws of this state.

Rights and purposes.

May hold real and personal estate to the value of \$200,000.

SECT. 3. The capital stock of said corporation shall be divided into shares of one hundred dollars each.

Shares.

SECT. 4. Any two persons named in this act may call the first meeting of this corporation, by causing a written notice of the time and place of meeting, to be delivered to each person named in this act, and by causing a notice of the same to be posted up in some public conspicuous place in Saccarappa village, at least one week previous to the meeting.

First meeting, how called.

SECT. 5. This act shall be in force from and after its approval by the governor.

Chapter 468.

An act to incorporate Star in the West Lodge, number eighty-five.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

SECT. 1. S. S. Coller and associates, and their successors, are hereby incorporated into a body politic, by the name of Star in the West Lodge, number eighty-five, established in Unity, in the county of Waldo, with power to sue and be sued ; to have a common seal and change the same ; to make any by-laws for the management of their affairs not repugnant to the laws of this state ; to take and hold, for charitable and other purposes, real estate to the

CHAP. 469. value of three thousand dollars, and personal property to the amount of two thousand dollars; to give and grant, bargain or sell the same; with all the privileges granted to other societies instituted for similar purposes.

Powers,
privileges, &c.

First meeting,
how called.

SECT. 2. S. S. Collier is hereby authorized to fix the time and place of the first meeting of the corporation, at such time and place as he may direct.

SECT. 3. This act shall take effect when approved by the governor.

Chapter 469.

An act to incorporate the Winnegance Mill-dam Company.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Corporators.

SECT. 1. Winslow Morse, Frederick J. Parks, R. S. Hunt, James Oliver, Obadiah Trask, James H. Oliver, John G. Morse, Bradford Sprague and William Rogers, their associates and successors, assignees of William M. Rogers, late of Bath in the county of Sagadahoc, deceased, and proprietors of the mills erected on Winnegance creek, at the dam erected pursuant to a special act of the legislature, authorizing the said William M. Rogers, his heirs and assigns, to erect and maintain a dam for the purpose of raising a water power to propel the machinery of mills and other manufactories across Winnegance creek, from land of said Rogers in the town of Bath, to land of said Rogers in Phippsburg; said act approved the tenth day of March, eighteen hundred and thirty-five.

Rights.

SECT. 2. Said corporation is authorized to keep up, repair and maintain the said mill-dam at its present height, and to own all the real and personal estate necessary and proper to enable it to accomplish the purposes of this act.

SECT. 3. This act shall take effect when approved by the governor.
