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CHAP. 480.

Corporate name.

Seal and by-laws.

May hold real and personal estate.

First meeting, how called.

Norcross, Luther Glidden, Charles H. Wilson, Columbus C. Hutchinson and William Buzzell, their associates and successors, are hereby constituted a body politic and corporate, by the name of the Aroostook County Agricultural Society; with power by that name to prosecute and defend suits at law; to have and use a common seal; to make by-laws and regulations for the management of their affairs, not repugnant to the laws of the state; to take, hold and possess real and personal estate, the yearly income of which shall not exceed five thousand dollars, to be used exclusively for the improvement of agriculture, manufactures and the mechanic arts; and said corporation shall have power to improve, lease, sell and convey the same at their discretion, as other proprietors of real and personal estate may lawfully do; and for the purposes aforesaid, shall have and exercise all the powers and privileges usually granted to similar corporations.

SECT. 2. Lyman O. Putnam, is hereby authorized to fix the time and place of holding the first meeting of said corporation, and to give notice of the same by advertisement thereof, in the Aroostook Times, a newspaper printed in Houlton, seven days, at least, before the time of holding said meeting.

SECT. 3. This act shall be in force on and after the signature by the governor.

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### Chapter 480.

An act to authorize the Second Parish in Scarborough to convey their property to the Methodist Society of Scarborough.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :*

Second parish in Scarborough authorized to convey all real estate, &c.

SECT. 1. Authority is hereby granted to the Second Parish in Scarborough, to convey all the real estate owned by said parish, and the income which has accrued thereon, to the Methodist Society of Scarborough, to be held by said society in trust, with the

right to apply the income thereof for the support of public worship in said parish. CHAP. 481.

SECT. 2. Said parish, at a legal meeting thereof, may appoint their treasurer, as their agent, to make a conveyance of said property; and upon such appointment, it shall be his duty to convey all the real estate of said parish to said society, and pay over all funds in his hands to said society, to be held and used for the purposes named in the preceding section.

Sale, how made.

SECT. 3. This act shall take effect when approved.

### Chapter 481.

An act to authorize the construction of a wharf in the town of Kittery.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :*

SECT. 1. Andrew J. Stimson and Martin V. B. Stimson, their heirs and assigns, are hereby authorized to construct and maintain a wharf on their land in the town of Kittery, in the county of York, bordering on the shore of Piscataqua river at the foot of Commercial street, Navy Yard Village, so called, and extending into and over tide waters, a sufficient distance to afford a depth of ten feet of water, at low water, at lowest course of tides; said wharf, not to exceed forty feet in width, and thirty-five feet in length beyond low water mark, at low course of tides.

Andrew J. Stimson and Martin V. B. Stimson authorized to construct a wharf, &c.

SECT. 2. This act shall take effect from and after its approval by the governor.

### Chapter 482.

An act to incorporate the Kennebec Horticultural Society.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :*

SECT. 1. That Edward A. Nason, Calvin Spaulding, E. K. Butler, Samuel Titcomb, E. A. Boardman, James W. North, Erastus Bartlett, Luther L. Allen, Russell Eaton, Thomas C. Noble, Joseph W. Clapp, Melvin Cunningham, O. C. Whitehouse, Hiram Fuller, Warren Percival, Thomas S. Lang and William T. Johnson, with their associates, successors and assigns, are hereby constituted a corporation by the name of the Kennebec Horticultural Society,
