Chapter 399.

Resolve in relation to reports of the adjutant general for the years eighteen hundred and sixty-one, eighteen hundred and sixty-two and eighteen hundred and sixty-three.

Reports of adjutant general, disposal of. Distribution,

how to be

made.

Resolved. That the copies of the reports of the adjutant general for the years eighteen hundred and sixty-one, eighteen hundred and sixty-two and eighteen hundred and sixty-three, now remaining undistributed, be disposed of as follows, viz:—one hundred copies of each year's report shall be deposited in the state library, to be disposed of as the legislature shall hereafter determine; one copy of the report of eighteen hundred and sixty-three, shall be given to each senator and representative of the present legislature; one copy of the report of each year shall be deposited in the probate court, and one copy in the registry of deeds of each county, to be there kept and preserved for public reference and use; one copy of each year's report shall be presented to each college and incorporated library in this state. Fifty copies of the report for each year, and the same number of each report he may hereafter make, shall be given to the adjutant general for his own use and disposal without any duty to account for the same; one hundred copies of each year's report shall be kept appropriated to public exchanges. Of any copies remaining on hand after the foregoing appropriations are supplied, each officer and soldier who shall apply for them to the adjutant general, shall receive one, in the order of application, till the whole shall be distributed.

Chapter 400.

Resolve in favor of the Passamaquoddy tribe of Indians for educational purposes.

Passamaquoddy Indians, in favor of.

Appropriation, how to be expended.

School committee of Princeton and Perry, &c. Resolved, That there be paid out of the treasury, under the direction of the governor and council, to the superintending school committees of Princeton and Perry, one hundred and fifty dollars, to be expended by them, for the purpose of maintaining among the Passamaquoddy Indians a school or schools for their education, and twenty-five dollars to purchase a stove and fixtures for the school house at Pleasant point. And said committees are requested

on or before the first day of January next, to make full returns of CHAP. 401. their doings, under this resolve, to the secretary of state, to be laid before the legislature, specifying the length of the school, by whom kept, the average number in attendance, amount paid to each teacher, and all items of expenditures and such other facts as they may deem for the interest of education among the Indians.

Resolve in favor of Newel Neptune.

Chapter 403.

Resolve in relation to the Penobscot tribe of Indians.

Resolved, That the Penobscot tribe of Indians are hereby authorized to choose their governor, lieutenant governor and representative to the legislature, and to manage their municipal officers in such way and manner as they may see fit, doing nothing contrary to the laws of this state in regard to the tribe.
