Chapter 79.

Снар. 79.

An act to incorporate the Albion Manufacturing Company.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Sect. 1. J. B. Besse, James S. Morrell, E. C. Fowler, Charles M. Rowe, Ora O. Crosby, H. Stratton, Joseph E. Thompson, D. G. Mudgett, J. L. Libbey and George Wilson, their associates and successors, are hereby constituted a body politic and corporate by the name of the Albion Manufacturing Company, with a capital stock of ten thousand dollars, to be divided into shares of one hundred dollars each, with all the privileges and powers and subject to all the duties and liabilities provided in the laws of this state concerning manufacturing corporations; and are authorized to manufacture in the town of Albion, flour and meal, and fabrics of wood, wool, cotton, iron and steel, and to purchase, use and hold real and personal estate to the amount of their capital stock, and to sell, lease and convey said estate, and to purchase, erect, maintain, alter and repair, on their own lands in said town, dams, mills, buildings, canals, sluiceways, penstocks and fixtures, necessary or suitable for carrying on the manufactures aforesaid.

Chapter 80.

An act to incorporate the Portland File Company.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Charles P. Kimball, Horatio N. Jose, George F. Shepley, Charles Staples junior, and E. R. Wiggin, their associates, successors and assigns, are constituted a body politic and corporate by the name of the Portland File Company, with all the powers and privileges and subject to all the duties and liabilities provided by the laws of this state concerning manufacturing corporations.

Location and purpose.

Capital stock.

Said corporation is authorized to manufacture steel rolling machines and files, in all its branches, in the city of Portland or the town of Cape Elizabeth; to purchase and hold real and personal estate not exceeding in value five hundred thousand dollars; to build and erect such buildings and machinery as their convenience may require, and make all necessary rules and regulations for the prosecution of the same, consistent with the laws of this state.
