CHAP. 107.

to pay the same, on the part of the collector of any city, town or plantation, it shall be the duty of the treasurer of the state to issue his warrant for enforcing the collection of the same against such collector. The warrant shall be directed to the sheriff or his deputies of the appropriate county, and made in accordance with the laws already existing on that subject, except that it shall be returnable in ninety days from its date, and in addition to the tax itself, it shall require the officer to collect interest thereon at the rate of six per centum yearly, from the day when the tax became payable, with fifty cents more for the warrant, and the lawful fees of such sheriff or deputies arising thereon.

SECT. 5. When any state tax assessed upon any city or town remains unpaid, such city or town is precluded from drawing from the state treasury the school fund set apart for such city or town, so long as such tax remains unpaid.

SECT. 6. This act shall take effect when approved by the governor.

Chapter 107.

An act to protect Union river from obstructions.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

Penalty for
causing
obstruction.

If the owners of any saw mills situated on the Union river suffer any slabs or edgings of any description, made in their mills, to be thrown therefrom into said river, they shall be liable to a penalty of not exceeding twenty dollars, nor less than five dollars, for each offence, to be recovered in an action of debt in the name of any person suing therefor.

Chapter 108.

An act to authorize the Milford and Princeton Turnpike Company to build a branch.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

Location and
route.

The Milford and Princeton Turnpike Company are hereby authorized to construct and maintain a branch, commencing at some point in township number two north division, Penobscot county, and intersecting said turnpike between said township number two,

and the town of Greenfield; subject to the same regulations, as to location, recording and damages, and the same limitations, restrictions and conditions, as provided in the charter of said Milford and Princeton Turnpike Company, excepting that the time for locating and recording the said branch, shall be extended to the first day of January in the year of our Lord eighteen hundred and sixty-eight.

Chapter 109.

An act to prevent the taking of fish from Pushaw lake by nets.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

SECT. 1. If any person takes or destroys any perch or pickerel in the Pushaw lake, in the town of Glenburn, by the use of nets, he shall forfeit five dollars for each perch or pickerel so taken or destroyed; said forfeit to be recovered by complaint or an action of debt, one half to the town of Glenburn and half to the person prosecuting therefor.

SECT. 2. This act takes effect when approved.

Chapter 110.

An act for the preservation of pickerel in Winthrop ponds.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

SECT. 1. If any person or persons shall take or destroy, except by hook and line, any pickerel in any pond or lake, lying wholly or in part, in the town of Winthrop, he shall forfeit five dollars for each pickerel so taken or destroyed, to be recovered by complaint or an action of debt, one half to the use of the town where the offence is committed and half to the person prosecuting therefor.

SECT. 2. This act will take effect when approved.
