CHAP. 19.**Chapter 19.**

Resolve in favor of William W. Quinby of Bucksport.

Pension.

Resolved, That there be paid from the state treasury to William W. Quinby of Bucksport, in the county of Hancock, three dollars per month for the two years past, and four dollars per month for the year ensuing, dating from the time of the approval of this resolve, for disability received while in the military service of the state.

Approved February 16, 1866.

Chapter 20.

Resolve in favor of the joint standing committee on the state prison.

Favor of J. H. Ramsdell for expenses of committee.

Resolved, That the state treasurer is hereby authorized and directed to pay J. H. Ramsdell the sum of one hundred and twenty dollars, it being for expenses incurred by the committee visiting the state prison the nineteenth of January ultimo.

Approved February 16, 1866.

Chapter 21.

Resolve in favor of the committee on education.

Favor of C. Stone for expenses of committee.

Resolved, That the state treasurer is hereby authorized and directed to pay to Cornelius Stone the sum of sixty-eight dollars, it being for expenses incurred by the committee on education in visiting the State Normal School at Farmington.

Chapter 22.

Resolve for the preservation of flags, guidons and war trophies deposited with the state.

Injury or loss consequent upon removal of flags, trophies, &c.

WHEREAS, the regimental battle flags, guidons and war trophies deposited in the state house for preservation and safe keeping, are liable to injury or loss by being removed therefrom, and as these precious memorials of the sacrifices and gallantry of the soldiers of Maine should be safely preserved and carefully protected, be it therefore

Resolved, That from and after the passage of this resolve, no national or regimental flags or flags, guidons or trophies of the war therein deposited, shall be removed upon any pretence whatever, except in case of fire or other danger thereto which may render such removal necessary; and the governor and council are hereby authorized to cause, as soon as practicable, a historical record of each regiment, battalion and battery of Maine volunteers engaged in the service of the United States during the late rebellion to be prepared, suitably framed and suspended below the colors borne in service by such regiments and batteries, so deposited or which may hereafter be deposited for preservation in the state house, and to audit accounts for service and expense in preparing such records, and allow payment therefor from any moneys in the state treasury not otherwise appropriated.

Chapter 23.

Resolve in favor of the state prison.

Resolved, That the sum of thirty-five hundred dollars is hereby appropriated, for the building of a stable, with carriage and slaughter house annexed, piggery, lumber house, wood house, cisterns and necessary repairs.

Chapter 24.

Resolve making appropriations in aid of roads and bridges in the county of Aroostook.

Resolved, That there be appropriated, to be expended under the direction of the land agent, upon roads and bridges in the county of Aroostook, for repairing Fish River road and bridges thereon, twelve hundred dollars; for repairing and aiding upon the road leading from Presque Isle to Ashland, nine hundred dollars; for opening and repairing the road through township F, range one, four hundred dollars; for repairing the military road through south half township number two, range three, three hundred dollars; for aid upon the road leading from the military road to Tuck's mills in township number two, range three, five hundred dollars; for repairing the Aroostook road between the towns of Ashland and Patten, four hundred dollars; for aid in opening a road from Caribou or Salmon brook to Fish River road, five hundred dollars; for
