Chapter 34.

CHAP. 34.

Resolve in relation to the duties of Indian agents.

Resolved, That it shall be the duty of the agents of the Penobscot and Passamaquoddy tribes of Indians, in their annual report to the governor and council to state the amount of their disbursements, with the items, to whom paid and for what purposes, and to prepare an extra copy to be left with the governor of each tribe.

Chapter 35.

Resolve for the appointment of commissioners to the World's Fair in Paris.

Resolved, That the governor be and hereby is authorized and instructed to appoint four or more commissioners to attend the World's Fair in Paris, to be holden in June, eighteen hundred and sixty-seven. Said commissioners to defray their own expenses and to have no claim upon the state for any part thereof.

Chapter 36.

Resolve in relation to the Penobscot tribe of Indians.

WHEREAS, difficulties exist between the two parties of the Penobscot tribe of Indians, known as the old and new party, in relation to the choice of their governor, lieutenant governor and representative to the legislature, which are detrimental to their pecuniary and domestic interests; in order to remove and avoid such difficulties, therefore

Resolved, That the Penobscot tribe of Indians hereafter be allowed to elect, by ballot, their governor, lieutenant governor and representative to the legislature on the second Tuesday of September, annually; and that the old and new party, so called, be allowed to select from their respective parties candidates for said offices, alternately, commencing with the old party for the year eighteen hundred and sixty-seven.
