premises. The property of said corporation shall be exempt from CHAP. 175. taxation.

SECT. 4. Any three persons named in this act, are authorized to call the first meeting of this corporation, by giving public notice thereof in two of the daily papers printed in Portland, one week before the time appointed for the meeting. Organization.

SECT. 5. This act shall take effect on its approval by the governor.

Chapter 175.

An act to authorize Robert Huckins to construct fish-weirs in Johnson's Bay, in Lubeo.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

Robert Huckins is hereby authorized to construct and maintain a fish-weir, or fish-weirs, in front of his land, in the waters of Johnson's Bay, in Lubeo, within the limits of two parallel lines extending sixty-five rods from high water mark, northerly in the same direction as the easterly line of his land; the distance between the two parallel lines being the width of his land at high water mark; *provided* that such weir or weirs shall not be constructed so as to interfere with the navigation of the waters of said Johnson's Bay, nor to interfere with the riparian rights of owners. Location and boundaries.

Chapter 176.

An act to incorporate Paris Lodge Number Ninety-four of Free and Accepted Masons.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

SECT. 1. John Bicknell, William R. Howe and Alden Chase, their associates and successors, are hereby incorporated into a body politic by the name of Paris Lodge Number Ninety-four of Free and Accepted Masons, to be established and have their place of business in the town of Paris, in the county of Oxford, with power to acquire by purchase or otherwise, real and personal estate, to the value of ten thousand dollars; to give and grant or bargain and sell the same at pleasure, with all the powers and privileges usually granted to corporations for masonic, benevolent Corporators.

CHAP. 177. and charitable purposes, not inconsistent with the laws of this state.

Organization. **SECT. 2.** The first meeting of said corporation may be called by either of the persons named in the first section of this act by publishing notice thereof in the Oxford Democrat, a newspaper published at Paris in said county of Oxford, fourteen days at least before said meeting.

SECT. 3. This act shall take effect when approved by the governor.

Chapter 177.

An act authorizing the construction and maintenance of a wharf in Augusta.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

Corporators. Benjamin F. Parrott and Henry W. Bradbury, their heirs and assigns, are hereby authorized to construct and maintain a wharf
 Location. on their land in Augusta, in the county of Kennebec, on the west
 Extension. side of the Kennebec river, north of the town landing, to be known
 as Central wharf, and to extend the same into said river not ex-
 ceeding two feet beyond the wharf as now constructed.

Chapter 178.

An act to authorize the building of a wharf in the town of Stockton.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

Corporators. J. A. Colcord, J. W. Mudgett, their associates, successors and
 Extension. assigns, are hereby authorized to build and extend a wharf into
 Location. tide water two hundred feet from low water mark, at or near the
 ship-yard of Colcord and Mudgett, in the town of Stockton.
