CHAP. 177. and charitable purposes, not inconsistent with the laws of this state.

Organization. **SECT. 2.** The first meeting of said corporation may be called by either of the persons named in the first section of this act by publishing notice thereof in the Oxford Democrat, a newspaper published at Paris in said county of Oxford, fourteen days at least before said meeting.

SECT. 3. This act shall take effect when approved by the governor.

Chapter 177.

An act authorizing the construction and maintenance of a wharf in Augusta.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

Corporators. Benjamin F. Parrott and Henry W. Bradbury, their heirs and assigns, are hereby authorized to construct and maintain a wharf

Location. on their land in Augusta, in the county of Kennebec, on the west side of the Kennebec river, north of the town landing, to be known

Extension. as Central wharf, and to extend the same into said river not exceeding two feet beyond the wharf as now constructed.

Chapter 178.

An act to authorize the building of a wharf in the town of Stockton.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

Corporators. J. A. Colcord, J. W. Mudgett, their associates, successors and assigns, are hereby authorized to build and extend a wharf into

Extension. tide water two hundred feet from low water mark, at or near the

Location. ship-yard of Colcord and Mudgett, in the town of Stockton.
