Chapter 200.

CHAP. 200.

An act to authorize the inhabitants of the town of Hartford to aid in the construction of a railroad to Centre Hartford.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

SECT. 1. The inhabitants of the town of Hartford, in the county of Oxford, are hereby authorized to raise and assess by taxation, or by loan of the credit of said town, a sum not exceeding one thousand dollars, and to apply and expend the same in constructing or aiding in the construction of an extension of the Portland and Oxford Central Railroad from Sumner Depot, so called, to Centre Hartford.

Amount of aid, how raised and applied.

SECT. 2. This act shall not take effect so far as to authorize said assessment or loan until it shall have been approved and adopted, and said assessment or loan authorized, by a vote of two-thirds of the legal voters of said town present and voting at a meeting duly called for that purpose, and shall take effect for all other purposes when approved by the governor.

When and how to take effect.

Chapter 201.

An act to incorporate Valley Cemetery Company of Greene.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

SECT. 1. Amos Clark, Augustus Sprague, D. L. Weymouth, Ingerson Parker, Merrick Lamb, their associates, successors and assigns, are hereby created a body corporate, to be established and have their place of business in Greene, in the county of Androscoggin, under the name of the Valley Cemetery Company, with power to take and hold for burial purposes, real and personal estate to the value of five thousand dollars; to give, grant or bargain and sell the same at pleasure, with all the privileges and rights usually granted to such corporations.

SECT. 2. Either of the persons named herein as corporators, may call the first meeting for organizing the company, by giving five days' personal notice to the others.

Organization.

SECT. 3. This act shall take effect when approved by the governor.
