Chapter 247.CHAP. 247.

An act to incorporate the Webster Trotting Park Association.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

SECT. 1. Ebenezer Webster, William Marden, Peleg T. Whitney, Charles M. Gould, James Webster, Preston Fisher, Samuel White, William H. White, John Libbey, William C. Taylor, Amos M. Phillips, Spencer and Wilson, Benjamin M. Weeks, Sewall Chapman, John W. Mayo, William Lunt and Jones S. Kelley of Orono, their associates, successors and assigns, are hereby created a body politic and corporate by the name of the Webster Trotting Park Association, with power to construct, maintain and use a trotting park in the town of Orono, and by that name shall have power to prosecute and defend suits at law, to have a common seal, and to change the same at pleasure, and to take, hold and convey, for the objects of their association, any estate, real or personal, the annual income of which shall not exceed five thousand dollars; and they are hereby invested with all the powers and privileges incident to similar corporations.

Corporators.

Purpose and powers.

Capital.

SECT. 2. Said association may adopt, from time to time, such rules, regulations and by-laws, not repugnant to the constitution and laws of this state, and may choose such officers, as they shall deem expedient for the proper management of their affairs.

Government.

SECT. 3. The stock of this corporation shall be divided into forty shares, at a par value of fifty dollars each.

Shares.

SECT. 4. Stockholders shall have one vote for each share owned and held, on which all assessments have been paid.

Representation.

SECT. 5. The first meeting of said association shall be called by C. M. Gould, or either of the persons named in the first section, by sending a written notice to the other corporators of the time and place of such meeting, at least seven days before such time arrives.

Organization.

SECT. 6. This act shall take effect when approved by the governor.

Chapter 248.

An act to make valid the doings of Pearl Street Universalist Society of Portland.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

SECT. 1. The doings of Pearl Street Universalist Society of Portland, at their meeting held on the sixteenth day of November,
