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CHAP. 284. the shore one hundred and fifteen feet, and to extend the same into tide waters in a westerly direction on the southern end fifty feet from the shore, and on the northern end one hundred feet from the shore.

SECT. 2. This act shall take effect when approved by the governor.

### Chapter 284.

An act to provide in part for the expenditures of government.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :*

Expenditures,  
how provided  
for.

SECT. 1. In order to provide for several acts and resolves of the legislature requiring the payment of money from the treasury, and also to provide for the necessary expenditures of government for the current fiscal year, the following sums are hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the treasury, and the governor, with the advice and consent of the council, is hereby authorized, at any time prior to the first day of January next, to draw his warrant upon the treasury for the same :

SECT. 2. This act shall take effect when approved by the governor.

### Chapter 285.

An act to incorporate the Hollis Manufacturing Company.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled,* as follows :

SECT. 1. Oliver Tracy, John Berryman and John Hanna, their associates, successors and assigns, are hereby created a body politic and corporate, by the name of the Hollis Manufacturing Company, with all the powers and privileges, and subject to all the duties and liabilities provided by law for manufacturing corporations.

Corporators.  
Powers, duties, &c.

SECT. 2. Said corporation is authorized to manufacture in Hollis, in the county of York, woolen and cotton goods, and goods of which cotton or wool forms a part, and all such articles and machinery as are usually connected with, or may be required for the purpose of such manufactures ; and also for the purpose of such manufactures to construct, repair and maintain, upon their own lands, suitable dams, canals, sluices, buildings and machinery ; and to purchase and hold real and personal estate not exceeding in

Purpose.  
Capital.
