Chapter 321.

CHAP. 321.

An act to change the name of certain persons.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

SECT. 1. Patrick O'Brien of Orrington, shall be allowed to take the name of William J. Bryant ; Josiah Albion Ingraham of Rockland, shall be allowed to take the name of Albion Ingraham. Names changed.

SECT. 2. This act shall take effect when approved by the governor.

Chapter 322.

An act to incorporate the Trustees of the Augusta Academy.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

SECT. 1. Howard Pettengill, Alfred Shaw, William Hanks, G. T. Fletcher, S. S. Webster, William E. Lowell, Judson Lawson, J. T. Sibley, Luther A. Church, Albert Gardner, their associates, successors and assigns, are hereby constituted a corporation by the name of the Trustees of Augusta Academy, and by that name may sue and be sued, have a common seal, make such by-laws, not repugnant to the laws of this state, as they may deem expedient for the management of their affairs, fill all vacancies occurring in their number, take and hold any estate, real or personal, that they now possess, or may hereafter receive by donation or otherwise, the annual income of which shall not exceed five thousand dollars, said income to be faithfully applied to promote the cause of education, and the trustees aforesaid are intrusted with all the privileges and powers incident to similar corporations. Powers of trustees.
Income, and how disposed of.

SECT. 2. Howard Pettengill is authorized to fix the time and place of the first meeting of said trustees, and to give each four days notice thereof in writing. First meeting.
