SECT. 3. This act shall take effect when approved by the governor. CHAP. 334.

Approved February 21, 1867.

Chapter 334.

An act to incorporate the Mousam Manufacturing Company.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

SECT. 1. Nathaniel L. Thompson, Joseph Titcomb, Joseph Dane, Charles Thompson, James M. Stone, William L. Thompson, Franklin Thompson and William F. Lord, their associates, successors and assigns, are hereby created a body politic and corporate, by the name of the Mousam Manufacturing Company, with all the rights and privileges, and subject to all the duties and liabilities of such corporations, as defined by the laws of the state.

Corporators.
Rights and duties.

SECT. 2. The said corporation is authorized to engage in the manufacture, in the town of Kennebunk, in the county of York, of brick, flour and meal, and fabrics of cotton, wool, paper, wood, boots and shoes, and iron and steel, and to purchase and hold, and use, real and personal estate to the amount of their capital stock, and to sell, lease and convey said estate, and to purchase, erect, maintain, alter and repair, on their own lands in said town, dams, mills, buildings, canals, sluiceways, penstocks, and fixtures suitable for carrying on the manufactures aforesaid.

Purpose.
Powers.

SECT. 3. The capital stock of said company shall not be less than one hundred thousand dollars, divided into shares of one hundred dollars each, and may be increased at any time hereafter, by a vote of the said company, to any sum not exceeding five hundred thousand dollars.

Capital.

SECT. 4. The affairs of the said company shall be managed by a board of five directors, and the time and place of holding the annual and other meetings, both of the directors and stockholders, shall be fixed by the by-laws of the company.

Directors.

SECT. 5. Any one of the persons named in this act may call the first meeting of the corporation, by a written notice given to each of the other persons named herein, seven days at least before the day specified for said meeting, said notices specifying the time, place and objects for which said meeting shall be called.

Organization.

SECT. 6. This act shall take effect when approved by the governor.
