Published by the Secretary of State, agreeably to Resolves of June 28, 1820, February 26, 1840, and March 16, 1842.

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RESOLVES

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<u>CHAP. 161.</u> trustees of Bates College, the deficiency, if any, shall be made up from any moneys in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, to be applied for the benefit of said Bates College in manner specifically set forth in said resolve; *provided* that all the conditions and provisions of said original resolve shall apply to this; *provided further*, that such sale shall be made by the land agent under the direction of the governor and council.

Approved February 28, 1867.

Chapter 161.

Resolves in favor of the state prison.

Resolved, That the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars is hereby appropriated for the reconstruction and enlargement of the westerly wing of the state prison, for the purchase of dwelling-houses and lots, for the extension of the carriage shop, and other necessary repairs.

Resolved, That the warden of the state prison, with the advice of the inspectors and approval of the governor and council, is authorized to purchase certain lots with dwelling-houses thereon, for the use of the subordinate officers of the prison.

Chapter 162.

Resolve of sympathy with the Cretans in their struggle for independence.

Resolved, That the people of the United States having secured to themselves the blessings of free government at the price of a revolutionary war, feel the greatest interest in the people of other lands who are struggling against oppression for their independence.

Resolved, That the people of the State of Maine recognize in the heroic efforts of the inhabitants of the island of Crete, to throw off the intolerable yoke of Turkish oppression, the struggle of Christianity against Mahometanism, and the endeavor of a brave people to secure for themselves and their posterity the blessings of a free government, and would hail with satisfaction the recognition of their independence by the United States.

Resolved, That a copy of these resolves be transmitted to our senators and representatives in congress, to be laid before congress.
