ing along the breadth of said granite quarry, and to extend the same into tide waters in a westerly direction three hundred feet, and also to build and maintain a wharf and grout bed in front of their land known as the Dyer Island Quarry, situated on Dyer's island, in said town of Vinalhaven, said wharf and grout bed to extend along the breadth of said quarry and into tide waters of the bay, in a westerly direction, three hundred feet.

This act shall take effect when approved.

#### Chapter 431.

An act to change the name of Ellen G. Williams.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

How changed.

SECT. 1. Ellen G. Williams of Hallowell shall be allowed to take the name of Ellen G. Otis.

Sect. 2. This act shall take effect when approved.

#### Chapter 432.

An act to incorporate the Knox Woollen Company.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Corporators.

SECT. 1. Andrew Fuller, Albert Johnson, Horatio Alden, David Knowlton, C. G. Bachelder, W. G. Adams, Johnson Knight, Henry Knight and T. R. Simonton, their associates, successors and assigns, are hereby constituted a body politic and corporate, by the

name of the Knox Woollen Company, with a capital stock of twohundred thousand dollars, to be divided into shares of one hundred dollars each, with the right by that name to sue and defend suits, and to have and use a common seal, and with the privileges and powers, and subject to all the duties and liabilities provided by the laws of this state concerning manufacturing corporations, and with authority to purchase and hold real and personal estate not exceeding in value at any one time the amount of the capital stock, and to improve, lease, sell, convey, or otherwise manage and dispose of the same as other owners of real and personal estate may do; and with authority to manufacture woollen goods in

the town of Camden, in said Knox county; said corporation to

have its office or place of general business in said Camden, and to Chap. 433. have authority to exercise any of the powers conferred by this Location. act, or other laws of this state, when twenty thousand dollars of the capital stock shall be taken and paid for, and with authority to Conditions. make all necessary regulations and by-laws for transacting the business of the corporation not repugnant to the laws of this state.

Sect. 2. Any two of the first three persons named in this act Organization. may call the first meeting of this corporation by causing written notices, by them signed, of the time and place of meeting to be given to each of the other corporators, seven days at least prior to the meeting; and six of said corporators shall make a quorum for said first meeting.

Sect. 3. This act shall take effect when approved.

### Chapter 433.

An act authorizing the maintenance and extension of wharves in Augusta.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Sect. 1. James W. North of Augusta, his heirs and assigns, are North's wharf hereby authorized to maintain the wharf in Kennebec river at extended. Augusta, known as North's wharf, and to extend the same into Kennebec river, not exceeding four feet beyond the limits of the wharf as now constructed.

Sect. 2. Said North, his associates, their heirs and assigns, are Vose wharf hereby authorized to maintain the wharf in Kennebec river at Au- extended. gusta, known as Vose wharf, and to extend the same into said river not exceeding four feet beyond the wharf as now constructed.

### Chapter 434.

An act to incorporate the Eastern Business College.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Sect. 1. That Frederic W. Warner, Samuel H. Dale, Samuel Corporators. D. Thurston, John E. Godfrey, Albert W. Paine, Charles P. Roberts, Willard A. Williams, Heman P. Smith, Hannibal Hamlin, and their associates and successors, are hereby constituted a body politic and corporate, by the name of the Eastern Business College,
