PRIVATE AND SPECIAL LAWS

CHAP. 435.	for the purpose of educating pupils in the various branches pertaining to a business education, to be located at Bangor, in the county of Penobscot, and for the furtherance of said object the said corporators may take and hold property, real and personal, to any amount not exceeding twenty-five thousand dollars, with power to buy, sell and manage the same as they may see fit, together with all the rights, privileges and powers, and subject to all the duties and liabilities provided by law for corporators.
Location.	
Capital.	
Powers.	SECT. 2. Said corporators shall be known as the directors of such corporation, and shall have power to fill any vacancies occurring in their board, so that there may be at all times nine members, a majority of which number shall be sufficient to form a quorum for the transaction of business.
Additional powers of directors.	SECT. 3. Said directors, in addition to the powers already granted, may by proper rules and by-laws prescribe the manner of conducting the affairs of the college, secure the discipline and order of the students, provide for the choice, qualifications and pay of officers and instructors, providing that such rules and by-laws shall not be inconsistent with the laws of the state, and in general to do whatever may be necessary for the promotion of the object of said institution.
Organization.	SECT. 4. Said Frederic W. Warner is authorized to call the first meeting of said corporation, by giving to each of said corporators a written notice of the time and place of meeting at least seven days before the time of meeting.

Chapter 435.

An act to incorporate the Portland and Waldoboro' Steamboat Company.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

Corporators.	SECT. 1. Cyrus Sturdivant, W. S. Dana, William Ross, S. M. Milliken, William Deering, W. W. Harris, Jonas H. Perley, W. F. Milliken, and associates, successors and assigns, are hereby constituted a body politic and corporate, by the name of the Portland and Waldoboro' Steamboat Company, for the purpose of carrying on the business of navigation, by vessels propelled by steam or otherwise, between the city of Portland and the town of Waldoboro', and any intermediate ports or places, with all the powers and privileges, and subject to all the duties and liabilities, provided by the general laws of this state.
Purpose and route.	
Capital.	SECT. 2. The capital stock of said corporation shall not be less than five hundred nor more than two thousand shares of fifty dol-

lars each. Any person subscribing to said stock shall be personally liable to pay the assessments thereon, not exceeding fifty dollars per share.

SECT. 3. Any three persons named in this act may call the first meeting of said corporation, for the purpose of organizing the same, by giving notice to each corporator, or by publication in some newspaper printed in Portland, at least seven days before the time appointed for said meeting.

Organization.

SECT. 4. This act shall take effect when approved.

Chapter 436.

An act to incorporate the Bangor Business College.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

SECT. 1. Corydon B. Lakin, Henry B. Bryant, and William H. Hobbs, their associates, successors and assigns, are hereby made and created a body politic and corporate, by the name, style and title of the Bangor Business College, and by that name shall have perpetual succession; may have a common seal, sue and be sued, purchase, hold and convey all property, personal and real, necessary for the use of, and immediately connected therewith, not exceeding the sum of fifty thousand dollars, and make all needful by-laws, orders and regulations for the management of the same not contrary to the constitution and laws of the state of Maine or of the United States.

Corporators.

Powers.

Capital.

SECT. 2. Said corporation shall have power to elect such officers as may be deemed necessary for the administration and government of said college.

Officers.

SECT. 3. Said corporation shall have the power to teach all the branches of learning necessary for the thorough and complete theoretical and business education of young men and women of our own state and of the United States, also all branches taught in other business colleges.

Purpose.

SECT. 4. Said Corydon B. Lakin is authorized to call the first meeting of said corporators, by giving to each of said corporators a written notice of the time and place of meeting at least seven days before the time of meeting.

Organization.

SECT. 5. This act shall take effect when approved.
