CHAP. 488.Powers, duties,
&c.

lars each; and said corporation is authorized to purchase, hold, improve, lease or sell, real and personal estate not exceeding in value at any one time the sum of one hundred thousand dollars, and shall have all the powers and privileges, and be subject to all the duties and liabilities, of similar corporations, as defined by the laws of this state.

Organization.

SECT. 3. Either of the persons herein named as corporators may call the first meeting of the corporation by giving seven days' personal notice thereof to the other corporators.

SECT. 4. This act shall take effect when approved.

Chapter 488.

An act to incorporate the Fox Island and Spruce Head Granite Company.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Corporators.

SECT. 1. Joseph R. Bodwell, Moses Webster, E. P. Walker, John S. Case, and their associates, successors and assigns, are hereby created a body corporate, by the name of the Fox Island and Spruce Head Granite Company, for the purpose of quarrying, cutting, dressing and shipping granite in all its forms, for building and other purposes.

Purpose.

Capital.

SECT. 2. The capital stock of said corporation shall be one hundred and fifty thousand dollars, divided into shares of one hundred dollars each; and said corporation is authorized to purchase, hold, improve, lease or sell, real and personal estate not exceeding in value at any one time the sum of one hundred and fifty thousand dollars, and shall have all the powers and privileges, and be subject to all the duties and liabilities, of similar corporations, as defined by the laws of this state.

duties.

Organization.

SECT. 3. Either of the persons herein named as corporators may call the first meeting of the corporation by giving seven days' personal notice thereof to the other corporators.

SECT. 4. This act shall take effect when approved.
