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any grapnel or spear in the aforesaid waters for the purpose of taking or destroying any trout, pickerel or perch, shall forfeit for each offence ten dollars, and whoever takes or destroys any such fish therewith shall forfeit five dollars for each fish so taken or destroyed.

CHAP. 494.

Penalties for taking same by other means than foregoing.

SECT. 3. All nets, seines, weirs and trawls set in said waters contrary to the provisions of this act, shall be forfeited to any person seizing the same, and no action shall be maintained in any court in this state against any person or persons for the recovery of damages for the taking or destruction thereof.

Unlawful implements so used, subject to seizure.

SECT. 4. The penalties and forfeitures provided for in this act may be recovered and appropriated as in section fifty-one, chapter forty, of the revised statutes.

Penalties and forfeitures, how recoverable.

### Chapter 494.

An act to incorporate the Harrison Water Power Company.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:*

SECT. 1. Samuel Thomas, Philander Tolman, Silas Blake, Samuel Gray, Joshua Howard and John Dawes, their associates, successors and assigns, are constituted and made a body politic and corporate, by the name of the Harrison Water Power Company, with all the powers and privileges, and subject to all the duties and liabilities, provided by the laws of this state concerning manufacturing corporations.

Corporators.

Powers, duties, &c.

SECT. 2. Said corporation is authorized to manufacture woollen and cotton goods in the town of Harrison, in the county of Cumberland, to purchase and hold real estate, including buildings and machinery necessary for manufacturing purposes, to the amount of thirty thousand dollars, and to sell the same, together or in parcels; said capital stock to be divided into shares of one hundred and twenty-five dollars each, and to make all necessary rules and regulations for prosecuting their designs as above stated, consistent with the laws of this state.

Location and purpose.

Capital. Shares.

SECT. 3. Either of the persons herein named as corporators may call the first meeting of the corporation by giving three days' personal notice to the other corporators.

Organization.
