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appoint, and the net income or profit thereof shall be divided by CHAP. 555. them among the persons making such deposits, their executors, Income and administrators or assigns, in just proportion.

SECT. 3. Samuel D. Bailey, named herein, is authorized to call Organization. the first meeting of said corporation, by giving seven days' notice in writing to each of the other corporators; and his affidavit of having given said notice, sworn to before any justice of the peace in said Bath, shall be conclusive evidence of the fact, at which meeting and at every subsequent annual meeting, said corporation may by ballot choose any person or persons as members thereof, may choose such officers as to them may seem necessary, who Officers. shall continue in office one year, and until others are chosen in their places. The treasurer and secretary elect, before entering upon their official duties, shall be sworn to the faithful performance thereof, and the treasurer shall further give satisfactory bond, to Official bonds. be approved by the corporation, for the faithful discharge of his duties, and with such other conditions as the corporation may require; provided however, that the offices of secretary and treasurer Proviso. may be united in one person.

All deeds of conveyance, covenants and grants made Conveyances. SECT. 4. in behalf of said corporation, shall be sealed with the corporate seal, and when made in pursuance of any vote of the corporation shall be valid and binding on the corporation.

SECT. 5. The annual meeting shall be holden at said Bath in Meetings. the month of January, and at that meeting and all other meetings it shall require at least seven of the corporators or their associates to constitute a quorum for the dispatch of business.

SECT. 6. This act shall take effect when approved.

Chapter 555.

An act to incorporate the Auburn Savings Bank.

Be it enacled by the Senale and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

SECT. 1. James Goff, Seth May, Samuel Pickard, Nelson Ding- Corporators. ley, James Dingley, William Libby, C. W. Walton, Jeremiah Dingley, Jr., William S. Young, Augustus M. Pulsifer, Horace C. CHAP. 556. SECT. 2. The purpose of the corporation is to receive deposits

in trust, to be loaned at interest or income for the benefit of the depositors. SECT. 3. Every depositor is entitled to receive back the amount

of his deposit at such times as the by-laws may prescribe, and the income resulting from the operations of the bank, after deducting reasonable expenses, shall belong to the depositors, and be paid to them in just proportions.

Chapter 556.

An act to incorporate the Waterville Hall Association.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

SECT. 1. Charles R. McFadden, George A. Phillips, Edward G. Meader, Reuben Foster, Everett R. Drummond, and Charles K. Mathews, their associates, successors and assigns, are hereby constituted a body corporate, by the name of the Waterville Hall Association, for the purpose of building and maintaining a block of buildings in Waterville, for a public hall, and other uses,

SECT. 2. Said corporation may purchase and hold real and personal estate to the amount of thirty-five thousand dollars, may erect and maintain a block of buildings in Waterville village, to be used for stores, halls and other purposes, and may improve, rent, lease, sell, convey and transfer the corporate property, as may be necessary.

SECT. 3. Said corporation shall have all the powers, and be subject to all the duties and liabilities, of corporations, as defined by the laws of the state.

SECT. 4. The first meeting may be called by a majority of the corporators, by giving seven days' notice, of time and place, in any newspaper published in Kennebec county.

SECT. 5. This act shall take effect when approved.
