Chapter 628.

CHAP. 628.

An act to legalize certain acts of the town of Buckfield in exempting town bonds from taxation.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

SECT. 1. The action of the inhabitants of the town of Buckfield, in town meeting March fourth, in the year eighteen hundred and sixty-seven, wherein they voted to instruct the selectmen of said town of Buckfield to fund the town debt in terms of payment of three, five and ten years, with such interest as they see fit to pay, is hereby declared binding and lawful upon the inhabitants of said town.

SECT. 2. The action of the inhabitants of the town of Buckfield, in town meeting April fifteenth, in the year eighteen hundred and sixty-seven, wherein they voted to exempt town bonds from taxation by said town until maturity, is hereby declared lawful and binding upon the inhabitants of said town of Buckfield; and the words "town bonds" as used in said vote are hereby declared to mean the bonds of the town of Buckfield aforesaid, and the same are hereby exempted from taxation for town purposes, provided the same are owned actually and in good faith by inhabitants of the town of Buckfield.

SECT. 3. This act shall take effect when approved.

Chapter 629.

An act to amend an act entitled "An act to incorporate the Cobbosseecontee Fish Cultivating Company," approved January twenty-nine, eighteen hundred and sixty-eight.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

SECT. 1. Section two of an act entitled "An act to incorporate the Cobbosseecontee Fish Cultivating Company," approved January twenty-nine, eighteen hundred and sixty-eight, is hereby amended by striking out in the third line thereof the words "ten years," and inserting instead thereof the words "twenty years," so that said section as amended shall read as follows :

SECT. 2. Said company shall have the power and exclusive right to propagate and cultivate and take eels for the term of twenty years from the passage of this act, in the Cobbosseecontee stream and its tributaries, and no person shall be allowed to take any of said eels, by setting any trap, net or seine therefor, and any person who shall violate the provisions of this act shall be

CHAP. 630. 'liable to a penalty of twenty-five dollars for every such violation, 'to be recovered on complaint of any person interested, before 'any justice of the peace, or any municipal or police court in the 'county of Kennebec.'

SECT. 2. This act shall take effect when approved.

Chapter 630.

An act to provide in part for the expenditures of government.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Appropriations.

In order to provide for several acts and resolves of the legislature requiring the payment of money from the treasury, and also to provide for the necessary expenditures of government for the current fiscal year, the following sums are hereby appropriated out of any moneys in the treasury, and the governor, with the advice and consent of the council, is hereby authorized at any time prior to the first day of January next to draw his warrant upon the treasury for the same:
