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PRIVATE AND SPECIAL LAWS

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SECT. 2. The first meeting of this corporation may be called by the persons named herein in first section or either of them, by giving notice of the time, place and purposes thereof in any public newspaper printed in the county of Kennebec, fourteen days at least before the time appointed thereof.

CHAP. 58

First meeting,  
how called.

SECT. 3. This act shall take effect when approved.

### Chapter 58.

An act to incorporate the Carratunk Falls Manufacturing Company.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :*

SECT. 1. Edmund Coolidge, Henry M. Bodwell, Benj. F. Rowell and Thos. S. Lang, their associates, successors and assigns, are hereby created a corporation by the name of the Carratunk Falls Manufacturing Company, and are authorized to take and hold real and personal estate to the amount of three hundred thousand dollars, for the purpose of manufacturing wool, cotton, flax, silk, lumber, iron, steel and other materials entering into industrial and manufacturing business.

Corporators.

Name.

May hold real and

SECT. 2. Said company is authorized to erect dams, mills, or other structures necessary for the purpose of manufacturing the articles aforesaid, at one or more places in the towns of Solon and Embden, in the county of Somerset.

May erect dams,  
mills, &c., where.

SECT. 3. The first meeting of said company may be called by either of the persons named in this act, by giving written notice to his associates seven days at least before the time of meeting.

First meeting,

SECT. 4. This act shall take effect when approved.

### Chapter 59.

An act additional to "an act to incorporate the Penobscot Log Driving Company."

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :*

SECT. 1. That on all logs exceeding forty feet in length driven by said company under their charter, such additional toll shall be assessed for driving, as in the opinion of the directors shall be reasonable, arising from the increased expense of driving the same.

**CHAP. 60.**May make  
contracts, &c.

Lien.

May build or  
assist in building  
&c., steamboats  
and other craft.

SECT. 2. Said company may make contracts for driving or assist in driving logs outside of the limits of the company on the Penobscot waters; and for any sum due for such driving, the same lien shall exist and be enforced in the same manner as is provided for other logs.

SECT. 3. Said company may build or assist in building and keep in repair, any steamboats or other craft, that in their opinion, or in the opinion of the directors, may be advantageous in facilitating the progress of the drive, the expense of which may be apportioned upon the logs of different years, as they may think proper.

SECT. 4. This act shall take effect when approved.

**Chapter 60.**

An act to incorporate the Waterville Mills.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:*

Corporators.

SECT. 1. F. P. Haviland, G. A. Phillips, John Webber and C. K. Mathews, their associates, successors and assigns, are constituted and made a body politic and corporate by the name of the Waterville Mills, with the powers and privileges and subject to all the duties and liabilities provided by the laws of this state concerning manufacturing corporations.

SECT. 2. Said corporation is authorized to manufacture wool, cotton, flax, iron, steel and other articles necessarily connected therewith, in the towns of Waterville or Winslow, to purchase and hold real and personal estate not exceeding one million dollars in value, to build and erect such buildings and machinery as their convenience may require, and make all rules and regulation for the prosecution of the same consistent with the laws of this state.

SECT. 3. F. P. Haviland or G. A. Phillips are hereby authorized to call the first meeting of this corporation by giving each of the others a written notice of the same seven days before such meeting.

SECT. 4. This act shall take effect when approved.
