Chapter 208.**CHAP. 208.**

An act to incorporate the Peoples Savings Bank.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

- SECT. 1. J. H. Bowler, James B. Fiske, S. H. Blake, S. C. Hatch, Walter Brown, H. E. Prentiss, A. D. Manson, Abram Woodard, E. A. Upton, Sylvanus Rich, Sidney Thaxter, Isaiah Stetson, George Stetson, A. S. Weed, H. A. Wood, A. G. Wakefield, S. D. Thurston, their associates and successors are hereby constituted a body politic and corporate by the name of the Peoples Savings Bank, with power by that name to prosecute and defend suits at law and equity, have and use a common seal, make by-laws for the management of their concerns not repugnant to the laws of the state. Said corporation shall be established in the city of Bangor, with the right to exercise and enjoy all the rights and privileges incident to such corporations.
- SECT. 2. Said corporation may receive from any person or persons any deposit or deposits of money, and may use the same for purposes hereinafter provided.
- SECT. 3. All deposits of money received by said corporation shall be used as they shall judge most for the benefit of said corporation, and the net income or profit thereof shall be by them divided among the persons making such deposits, their executors, administrators or assigns, in just proportions, and such deposits may be withdrawn at such reasonable times and in such manner as a majority of the corporation named in this act shall appoint.
- SECT. 4. The first meeting of said corporation may be called at such time and place as may be directed by any five of the corporators named in this act by giving notice thereof in the Bangor Whig and Courier, at least ten days previous thereto, at which meeting and every subsequent annual meeting said corporation may elect by ballot any person or persons as members thereof, may choose such officers as to them may seem proper for their organization and government, who shall so continue one year, and until others are chosen in their stead, and the persons elected treasurer and secretary before entering upon their official duties shall be sworn to the faithful performance thereof, and the former shall give bonds satisfactory to said corporation for the faithful discharge of his duties; *provided, however,* that the offices of treasurer and secretary may if deemed advisable be united in one person.
- SECT. 5. All deeds of conveyance, covenants and grants, made in behalf of said corporation, shall be sealed with the corporate seal, and when made in pursuance of any vote of the corporation

CHAP. 209. shall be valid and effectual to convey property or bind the corporation.

Annual meeting. **SECT. 6.** The annual meeting shall be holden in the month of July, and at that and all other meetings it shall require seven persons at least, to constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, and meetings may be directed at other times by the president or the corporation.

Chapter 209.

An act to incorporate the Farmington Choral Society.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

Corporators. **SECT. 1.** Chas. G. Allen, J. C. Tarbox, D. W. Pratt, J. T. Hunter, R. B. Norton, J. T. Gay, C. A. Allen, Rob. McCleery, H. H. Rice, J. S. Jacobs, Geo. B. Cragin and J. M. S. Hunter, their associates and successors, are hereby incorporated and made a body corporate and politic, by the name of the Farmington Choral Society, to be established and have their place of business in the town of Farmington, in the county of Franklin and state of Maine, with power to acquire by purchase or otherwise real and personal estate to the value of five thousand dollars, to give and grant or bargain and sell the same at pleasure, with all the powers and privileges usually granted to corporations for literary, benevolent and charitable purposes, not inconsistent with the laws of the state.

SECT. 2. The first meeting of said corporation may be called by either of the persons named in the first section of this act, by publishing notice thereof in the Farmington Chronicle, seven days at least before said meeting.

SECT. 3. This act shall take effect when approved.
