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RESOLVES

OF THE

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**Chapter 82.****CHAP. 82.**

Resolve designed to promote the settlement of the public and other lands in the state.

*Resolved*, That the governor be and hereby is authorized, with the advice and consent of the council, to appoint three suitable persons whose duty it shall be to ascertain what measures, if any, should be adopted by the state to induce settlements upon its unpeopled townships; where aid should be given in constructing necessary roads; what provision should be made for the education of the children of settlers at the expense of the state or otherwise, and report to the next legislature, with such other suggestions and recommendations as they may deem suitable to give effect to the purpose contemplated by this resolve. And the governor and council shall audit the claims of the commissioners for their services, and the sums thus allowed are to be paid out of the state treasury on the governor's warrant; *provided* the whole sum paid to said commissioners shall not exceed three hundred dollars.

Three persons may be appointed by the governor to promote the settlement of the public lands.

Report, to whom and when made.

Commissioners, how paid.

**Chapter 83.**

Resolve to change the time of holding the first session of the commissioners to take the valuation of the state.

*Resolved*, That the commissioners to be appointed, as provided by resolves approved February nineteenth, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine, shall hold their first session at the capitol in Augusta, on the eleventh day of October next, instead of the tenth day of the same month, as provided in said resolves.

Time changed.

**Chapter 84.**

Resolve to authorize the warden of the state prison to purchase a carriage repository.

*Resolved*, That the warden of the state prison be and is hereby authorized to purchase a building, with the land connected, now owned by Thomas O'Brien of Thomaston, and rented by the warden for a carriage repository; *provided* it can be purchased for a price that the inspectors of the prison would consider reasonable.
