The first person named in this act is hereby authorized to call the first meeting of said corporation by giving seven days written notice to each of the other corporators, at which meeting, and at every subsequent annual meeting, said corporation may elect by ballot any person or persons members thereof, may choose such officers as may to them seem proper for their organization and government, who shall continue in office one year Office, term of. and until others are chosen and qualified in their stead; and the persons elected treasurer and secretary before entering upon their official duties shall be sworn to the faithful performance thereof, and the treasurer shall give bonds satisfactory to said corporation Treasurer shall for the faithful discharge of his duties; provided that the office of secretary and treasurer may, if deemed advisable, be held by the same person.

All deeds of conveyance, covenants and grants made SECT. 4. in behalf of said corporation shall be sealed with the corporate seal, and when made in pursuance of any vote of the corporation shall be valid and effectual to convey real and personal property or bind the corporation.

SECT. 5. The annual meeting of the corporation shall be holden Annual meeting, in the month of May, and at all meetings of the corporation a majority of the corporators shall be necessary to constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

SECT. 6. The number of corporate members of the Yarmouth Number of Savings Bank shall not be less than eight nor more than sixteen, and said corporation at any legal meeting may establish by-laws By-laws. providing that members removing from the state or failing to attend the annual meetings for two successive years, unless excused by the corporation, shall cease to be members thereof.

This act shall take effect when approved.

Chapter 11.

An act to legalize the doings of the inhabitants of the town of Eustis.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

The mode of calling the town meeting of the town of Certain acts made Eustis, held on the twentieth day of July, eighteen hundred and seventy-one, and all the acts, votes and proceedings of the inhabitants of said town therein, are hereby ratified, confirmed and made

valid in the same manner as though said meeting had been held in the month of March or April, as was provided by the act incorporating said town.

Sect. 2. This act shall take effect when approved.

Chapter 12.

An act to incorporate the Trustees of the Wendell Institute and May School for Girls.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Corporators.

SECT. 1. Francis G. Butler, Timothy F. Belcher, Frederick V. Stewart, Alexander H. Abbott, Fred C. Perkins, A. H. S. Davis and C. C. Rounds, their associates and successors, are hereby incorporated into a body politic by the name of the Trustees of the Wendell Institute and May School for Girls, for the promotion of literature, science and morality.

SECT. 2. Said corporation are hereby vested with all the rights, privileges and immunities incident to similar corporations. They are authorized to use a common seal, to prosecute and defend suits at law, to make and establish by-laws and regulations for the management of their affairs, and the well ordering of said institute, not repugnant to the laws of this state, and to hold estate real and personal that they now possess, or may hereafter receive by gift, grant or otherwise, the yearly income of which shall not exceed the sum of two thousand dollars.

SECT. 3. Francis G. Butler is hereby authorized to call the first meeting of said corporation by posting up notices in two or more public places in Farmington Center Village, ten days at least before the meeting of said corporation.

SECT. 4. This act shall take effect when approved.
