Chapter 77.

An act to incorporate the Augusta Literary and Library Association.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Corporators.

SECT. 1. Lot M. Morrill, R. D. Rice, J. G. Blaine, J. W. Bradbury, Allen Lambard, Samuel Titcomb, J. P. Wyman, W. T. Johnson, Joseph Baker, Thomas Lambard, Joseph Homan, G. W. Quinby, Warren Johnson, W. S. Badger, W. P. Whitehouse, J. M. Haynes, Joshua Nye, J. T. Woodward, George G. Stacy, F. M. Drew, A. T. Thompson, M. V. B. Chase, J. B. Bell, J. W. Clapp, S. F. Robinson, W. B. Lapham, Selden Connor, B. H. Cushman, A. W. Wilder, J. H. Manley, Howard Owen, S. L. Boardman, W. E. S. Whitman, E. C. Allen, J. F. Pierce, Samuel W. Lane, G. E. Brickett, H. S. Osgood, H. A. DeWitt, Horace Jordan, H. H. Hamlen, G. C. Vose, H. W. True, E. F. Pillsbury, O. C. Whitehouse, J. J. Eveleth, George E. Weeks, C. B. Morton, S. W. Wyman, William Caldwell and David Cargill, their associates, successors and lassigns, are hereby constituted a body politic and corporate by the name of the Augusta Literary and Library Association, and by that name may prosecute and defend suits at law and in equity, may have and use a common seal, and establish such by-laws, rules and regulations as are necessary for the convenient management of their affairs and not repugnant to the laws of the state. Said corporation is created for the purpose of maintaining in the city of Augusta a library, reading room, courses of literary and scientific lectures, and for such other purposes as may come within the province of similar associations.

Corporate name.

Seal and by-laws.

Purpose.

Authorized to raise money.

May hold personal property not exceeding \$20,000.

First meeting, how called. SECT. 2. Said corporation is hereby authorized to raise money by assessment, by a vote of the majority of the members present at any meeting duly called at which a quorum shall be present; to hold personal property for the purposes above named, to an amount not exceeding twenty thousand dollars, and to do all other acts properly pertaining to the objects of the association.

SECT. 3. Any three of the corporators herein named are authorized to call the first meeting of said corporation, by giving notice of the time and place thereof in any newspaper published in Augusta, seven days before the time appointed for said meeting.

Sect. 4. This act shall take effect when approved.
