Chapter 92.

An act to make valid the doings of Hadley Fairfield as a justice of the peace and quorum.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

SECT. 1. That the acts of Hadley Fairfield as a justice of the Certain acts peace and of the quorum, within and for the county of Aroostook, from the ninth day of May, eighteen hundred and seventy-one, to the twenty-first day of October, eighteen hundred and seventyone, are hereby made valid and as effectual to all intents and purposes as if said Hadley Fairfield had been legally commissioned and qualified to act in said capacity.

SECT. 2. This act shall take effect when approved.

Chapter 93.

An act in addition to chapter four bundred and twenty-five of the special laws of eighteen hundred and sixty-eight, in relation to holding meetings of corporations out of the state.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

The western transportation and mining company, the Authorized to SECT. 1. name of which corporation has been changed under the provisions of chapter one hundred and sixty-four of the general laws of eighteen hundred and seventy, to Lake Superior and Puget Sound Company, is authorized to hold meetings for the transaction of business beyond the limits of the state; and the organization and proceedings of said company under the names aforesaid are. hereby made valid.
