SECT. 2. This act shall take effect when approved.

Chapter 208.

An act to prevent the taking of trout in Bellscoep Meadow brook, in the town of Waldoborough.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

SECT. 1. No person shall be allowed to catch or take any trout from Bellscoep Meadow brook, so called, in the town of Waldoborough, in Lincoln county, for the term of five years, under a penalty of five dollars for each trout so taken, to be recovered in an action of debt, one-half to go to the prosecutor and one-half to said town of Waldoborough.

SECT. 2. This act shall take effect when approved.

Chapter 209.

An act to incorporate and prescribe the duties and powers of the Maine Poultry Association.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

SECT. 1. Fred Atwood, Albert Noyes, J. W. Lang, B. F. Hamilton, George E. Stockwell, Allen Carter, Seward Dill, Ezra Manter, S. L. Boardman, Fred Sawyer, Rufus Prince, D. M. Dunham, Walter Haley, John F. Libby, J. W. Eveleth, and William Swett, their associates successors and assigns, be and are hereby created a corporation by the name of the Maine Poultry Association, with power by that name to sue and be sued, use a common seal, make a constitution and by-laws for the management of their affairs, and to hold and exercise all the powers and privileges incident to similar corporations.

CHAP. 210.

SECT. 2. The first three persons named in this act shall be a committee to call the first meeting of this association, by giving suitable notice in the *Maine Farmer*.

SECT. 3. At the first meeting of this association the said corporators shall organize by the choice of a president, secretary, treasurer, and such other officers as may be deemed necessary; and at each annual meeting, on the third Tuesday of January thereafter, said association shall elect said officers, and seven members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

SECT. 4. Said association may take and hold property, real and personal, to an amount not exceeding ten thousand dollars, the income of which shall be applied exclusively to the object and interests of the association; and the treasurer of said society shall give suitable bonds for the safe keeping of said property and for the faithful discharge of his duties.

SECT. 5. This act shall take effect when approved.

Chapter 210.

An act to incorporate the the town of Eaton.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

Town of Eaton,
to incorporate.

SECT. 1. Crooked Brook plantation and Forest City, composed of number nine, range four, north of Bingham's Penobscot purchase, in Washington county, is hereby incorporated into a town by the name of Eaton, and the inhabitants of said town are hereby invested with all the powers, privileges, immunities and liabilities of other towns.

SECT. 2. Any justice of the peace within the county of Washington is hereby empowered to issue his warrant to some inhabitant of said town, directing him to notify the inhabitants thereof to meet at such time and place as he shall appoint, to choose such officers as other towns are empowered to choose.

SECT. 3. The town hereby created shall take the effects belonging to township number nine, range four, in said county of Washington, and shall assume all the obligations thereof.

SECT. 4. This act shall take effect when approved.
