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**Chapter 294.**

CHAP. 294.

An act to incorporate the Dixfield Cheese Factory.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :*

SECT. 1. D. M. Torrey, C. W. Eustis, W. S. Chase, C. H. Kidder, William W. White, John B. Staples, Sewell Goff, Samuel White, Marion Holman, Albion P. Marsh, J. J. Holman, Hosea Newton, John A. Marsh, Columbus Marsh, A. P. White, and F. C. Richards, their associates, successors and assigns, are hereby created a body politic and corporate by the name of the Dixfield Cheese Manufacturing Company, with all the powers and privileges, and subject to all the duties and liabilities provided by the laws of this state concerning manufacturing corporations.

Corporators.

Corporate name.

Powers, privileges and liabilities.

SECT. 2. Said corporation is authorized to manufacture cheese and transact any other business usually carried on by cheese factories or corporations for the purpose of associated dairying. The capital stock of said company or corporation shall not exceed the sum of three thousand dollars, to be divided into such number of shares as the company may determine; and said corporation may hold real and personal estate to the amount of said capital stock with full power to manage and dispose of the same.

Purpose.

Capital stock and shares.

May hold real and personal estate.

SECT. 3. The first meeting of said corporation shall be held in the town of Dixfield, and shall be called by notice thereof seven days prior to said meeting, signed by one of the persons named in the first section of this act, a copy of which shall be given to each of the other corporators.

First meeting, where held and how called.

SECT. 4. This act shall take effect when approved.

**Chapter 295.**

An act to incorporate the Bartlett Land and Lumber Company.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :*

SECT. 1. Samuel Hanson of Buxton, D. R. Hastings of Fryeburg, Isaiah S. Brown, H. N. Jose, and Henry C. Newhall, of Portland, their associates, successors and assigns, are created a body politic and corporate, by the name of the Bartlett Land and Lumber Company, with the powers and privileges of similar corporations; office to be located in Portland.

Corporators.

Corporate name.

Powers and privileges.  
Office.

SECT. 2. The capital stock of said corporation shall not be less than fifty thousand dollars nor more than two hundred thousand

Capital stock and shares.

CHAP. 296. dollars, divided into shares not less than five hundred, nor more than two thousand shares of one hundred dollars each.

May hold real and personal estate, erect buildings and mills.

SECT. 3. The corporation may acquire and hold real and personal estate, not exceeding the amount of the capital stock, and may erect any buildings, fixtures, or privileges, which they may deem expedient, and may build mills and operate the same, and engage in carrying on every description of manufacturing business not prohibited by the laws of the state.

First meeting, how called.

SECT. 4. Any two of the corporators are hereby empowered to call the first meeting of said corporation, by giving such previous written notice therefor to the other corporators at such time and place as they may think proper, at which meeting any corporative business may be transacted.

SECT. 5. This act shall take effect when approved.

## Chapter 296.

An act to incorporate the Maine State Temperance Reform Association.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :*

Corporators.

SECT. 1. Joshua K. Osgood, E. A. Chadwick, George E. Brickett, Eben F. Pillsbury, D. W. Whitehouse, E. W. Stetson, T. H. Hubbard, David Foye, Rodney L. Fogg, Cyrus Sturdevant, Frank Kenrick, W. W. Rice, Henry Farrington, Joseph Williamson, E. F. Wyman, Frank Nickerson, Samuel Marshall, Joshua L. Chamberlain, D. B. Randall, James Nash, Joshua Nye, Nelson Dingley, junior, H. M. Bryant, J. Francis Murphy, H. A. Shorey, F. E. Shaw, O. G. Hall, their associates and successors, are hereby constituted a body politic and corporate by the name of the Maine State Temperance Reform Association, for the purpose of promoting temperance and sobriety by means of reform associations, pledges, instruction, and other moral means; and for that purpose may hold real and personal estate not exceeding ten thousand dollars, and adopt by-laws not inconsistent with the laws of the state, for the management of such association.

Corporate name.

Purpose.

May hold real and personal estate. By-laws.

First meeting, how called.

SECT. 2. George E. Brickett is authorized to call the first meeting of said association, by publishing a notice of the same in the Kennebec Journal, published at Augusta, at least five days before the time of holding said meeting.

SECT. 3. This act shall take effect when approved.
